Thoughts from the Rabbi...

מחשבות Makh'shavot

Much mutual anticipation leads to the moment when our covenant is established with God at Sinai. In the midrash, our sages imagine God looking out across the



desert wilderness for the first sight of the nation of Israel rising from Egypt like a bride moving toward her wedding canopy. From the moment God, as groom, first beholds her, God anticipates their loving embrace

and the world-altering life they will build together. Indeed, life on Earth is fundamentally changed by the rise of the Jewish people on the world stage.

That rabbinic imagining reminds me of how it felt for me to come to BIC. We courted one another with delightful anticipation, formalized our commitment to one another, and celebrated our union with a beautiful seudah (feast) on our first Shabbat. And now, we begin to write our new, living Torah together amidst the excitement and discovery of our new covenant. I continue to be amazed by the ways in which Beth Israel Center embodies a true kehillah k'doshah, a sacred community, and I am honored and excited to work with you as we push ourselves even higher. With tradition as our backdrop, new ideas and innovations will begin to take root as we nurture our community into the next era, together.

In the newness of our relationship, this is also the time when we begin preparing to greet the New Year. To that end, as we are getting to know each other and preparing for our High Holy Day services, there will be opportunities for learning and introspection. "Neshama Boot Camp" in August will help us make the most of key High Holy Day liturgical texts, and "Breaking Water" on Sept. 2 will empower us to explore possibilities for immersing in our beautiful mikvah as

a soulful practice of rebirth. *Kever K'rovim* (visiting the graves of loved ones) on Sept. 16 will be a time for supported reflection on the brevity of our lives, our connections to our past, and our commitments to our loved ones.

In the coming years, I will work with the Ritual Committee to build on our already beautiful prayer services. We look forward to exploring new opportunities for engagement such as a musical warm-up to Shabbat morning services called זמר Zemer and pre-Shabbat משמר Mishmar song and d'var Torah sessions on Thursday evenings.

...And we will learn Torah in new wavs! In our בית מדרש beit midrash (house, or, in our case, room of study) I envision yeshiva-style Talmud study, Midrash with artistic expression through a class called "Studio Sinai," and Jewish approaches to contemporary issues in a class called "Living Torah." Our Scientists in Synagogues initiative that began in July will continue to engage adults and teens in exploring the relationship between science and Torah. Finally, there will be opportunities to study sources on the weekly Torah portion after Shabbat Kiddush. Watch your email and future Centerites for details.

I am eager to get to know every member of BIC, from seniors to infants. Please take advantage of opportunities for us to get acquainted, and please also make arrangements to visit with me in my office, your home, or elsewhere. My family is eager to build relationships with you, as well.

As we look forward to joining together as a congregational family on the High Holy Days, I wish each of you, and all of us together, a שנה טובה ומתוקה Shanah Tovah um'tukah, a good and sweet year! May it be filled with the joy of discovery and the delight of connection and relationship.

President's Column

Coming Full Circle

In these final months in office, I've been marveling at how far I've traveled over the past few years, and yet how familiar it's all felt along the way. When I was first elected. I had little idea of the scope of the President's duties, nor of the complexity of the inner workings of the shul. The budget process was completely alien to me, and I had only the vaguest notion of our committee structures. I worried about how few names I knew. and wondered how on earth I'd ever remember them all. As my term nears completion, I feel gratitude, to the community and to the staff for all their hard work and patience as I've learned and made mistakes, and grown as a result. many projects, the

These months have seen much work completed. At its June meeting, the Board approved a balanced budget that was fiscally restrained, yet still included funds to increase our Education Director's percent appointment to assist in

Adult Education as our new Rabbi transitions into her leadership position here at BIC. We also approved a large increase in funds to subsidize the costs of catered Shabbat dinners at BIC to encourage participation in these community events. Even more to a happy confluence of strong fundraising, restrained spending and favorable interest rates, we have cleared the outstanding debt to our endowments remaining from our 1995 remodeling project. For the first time in recent memory, BIC is debt-free. Thanks to Jordy Loeb and Don Miner for their hard work on that issue. We have also completed the process of becoming a supporting member of the Dane Sanctuary Coalition (DSC), an idea first introduced to us by Rabbi Joshua Ben-Gideon a few years back. As a supporting congregation, we will provide volunteers and logistical

support to individuals identified by the DSC who are fighting what it considers an unjust deportation order. Many thanks to Sally Jones and Judy Pierotti for their

patience and hard work in educating the Board and the congregation about this important issue, and for helping to set the parameters of our participation in the process.

calendar pages turn as well. The Ritual Committee is busy planning for High Holy Day services, which will be the first under our new long-term contract with Rabbi Diamond that ensures his participation in our services for many more years to come. In the coming months, we are

excited to introduce programming under the Scientists in Synagogues project (see page 7), which will enliven our adult and teen education programs and deepen our understanding of both science and Judaism. Looking even a little farther into the future, we are already planning impressive, I am pleased to report that due for Rabbi Forester's installation weekend in January 2019, which will include a special party on Saturday night, January 25, to celebrate our new relationship with her, as well as BIC's 70th anniversary.

Naomi Malka, Mikvah Expert

At the end of August, we will welcome Naomi Malka to Madison. She is the director of the Adas Israel Community Mikvah in Washington, DC, trained as a Mikvah Guide at Mayyim Hayyim in Newton, MA, and is a founding member of the Rising Tide New Mikvah Network. In spring 2010, Naomi served as the ritual consultant for DCJCC Theater J's production of the Israeli play "Mikveh." She is a frequent lecturer and writer on the subject of mikvah. Naomi is also the founder of Tevila b'Teva/Immersion in Nature, a program that introduces outdoor immersion to Jewish summer camps and outdoor programs. Naomi created an award-winning program called "Bodies of Water," funded by the Tikkun Olam Women's Foundation, to introduce kids ages 10+ to Mikvah as a tool for positive body image and healthy decision making from a Jewish perspective. She will lead a variety of sessions over two days; more information is on page 6.

What's New, and What's Not

Every summer, I reflect on the past school year in preparation for planning for the coming one. Being a Jew, and a Jewish educator, I do this with a text by my side, in this case, the Mission and Vision of Beth Israel Center Talmud Torah and the Portrait of Beth Israel Center Talmud Torah Graduates. Now, two years after our big change to a Shabbat-centered school, it becomes clear that a series of small adjustments would make a stronger program and help us achieve better student outcomes.

Our biggest question going into year one of our Shabbat-centered school was what to do with our youngest students, the kindergartners. During the first year,

kindergarten was
free and optional on
Shabbat mornings,
as we knew from our
conversations with
congregants that
some families
preferred to use the
kindergarten year as
a transition to full
time school and
have a minimum of

extra-curricular activities. We watched Shorashim, our K-2 Shabbat service, closely for age-appropriateness and community building, and we kept attendance data for the kindergarten-age students. We spoke with parents whose children were attending regularly and those who were not. Through the data and the conversations, it became clear that kindergarteners belonged in Shorashim, so we added an expectation that kindergarten students attend on Shabbat (only) in year two. Watching this group of students throughout the past year, we observed that being combined with 1st and 2nd grades and never having time to be with just their classmates was not encouraging them to bond in the way that we wanted or would expect. Since building community is an important part of our school, in the coming year the kindergarten will join us on Tuesdays as

well as Saturdays, and their teacher will be Ellen Weismer, whom many of you know through her work at Gan HaYeled,

Camp Shalom and elsewhere in our Jewish community. She is well versed in early childhood Jewish education. Expanding the experience for our incoming kindergarten class



allows us to better meet our mission to "... experience the joy of learning and being together in a Jewish community."

We are very excited to welcome

Rabbi Forester to our Talmud Torah community, as well. She has begun to get to know our students, through visits to Camp Interlaken JCC and Camp Ramah in Wisconsin, as well as Shabbat and other gatherings here in

gatherings here in
Madison. Rabbi Forester will be a
presence in our classrooms and Shabbat
services, both in concrete curriculumbased ways and as a welcomed guest and
fortuitous question answerer and Jewish
expert. Rabbi Forester will get to know
our curriculum, vision and mission, and
she and I will work together to find her
place in shaping the future of our school.

I hope you will share my excitement about these changes and will see them play out not only on our bima on Saturday mornings when school is in session but also as these young people grow to become b'nai mitzvah and future leaders in our congregation and whatever Jewish communities they find themselves in.

Scientists in Synagogues

Beth Israel Center was recently awarded a grant to support our participation in a project called Scientists in Synagogues, aimed at promoting dialog about the intersection of science and Judaism. The project is sponsored by Sinai and Synapses, a joint venture of the national organization Clal, which works to promote an expansive

and post-denominational Jewish worldview, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the world's largest scientific society. BIC's proposal is titled "Dynamic Connection, Divine Reflection." Drawing on the expertise of more than two dozen scientists

who are members of our congregation, as well on our professional staff and Adult Education Committee, we will build on established programming, such as Summer Book Discussion & Meditation, Kolot Kehillah and Midrasha, to explore the compatibility of scientific observations of the dynamics of the universe and the interconnectedness of being on the one hand, and traditional Jewish notions of the Divine on the other.

Rabbi Forester and President Matt Banks recently attended a daylong workshop in New York City organized by Sinai and Synapses. We gathered with the other members of our cohort—11 synagogues selected from 55 applicants—to gain exposure to key thinkers and scholars interested in intersections of science and religion and the key issues that drive the Scientists in Synagogues program, to build a network and begin sharing ideas, and to learn how the organization can support BIC's ambitious project. Our colleagues were impressed by our plans, and learning about theirs gave us ideas for future programming. We also saw the results of the survey on science and Judaism. (Thanks to all who participated!) Interestingly, the data showed that Jews are much more likely than other religious groups to view science and religion as completely

independent, or, if in conflict, to trust

in the primacy of science.

Our first program is currently underway. We are meeting every other Thursday during the summer to discuss Daniel Matt's book, God and the Big Bang, in preparation for the High Holy Days. Over the next year and a half, we'll be reading books such as Close Encounters with Human Kind by Sang-Hee Lee and The Hidden Life of Trees by Peter Wohlleben and Jane Billinghurst, with the timing of each

book discussion series coordinated with events in the Jewish calendar. Please join us for these discussions, and watch for announcements of other upcoming Scientists in Synagogues programming. We look forward to learning together and deepening our understanding of Judaism and the natural world.
