Thoughts from the Rabbi...

A New Siddur to Renew our Hearts and our Prayers

Five years ago, Beth Israel Center was in the vanguard of the Conservative movement in our adoption of *Mahzor Lev Shalem*. I can't speak for all of the



members of the Ritual Committee at the time, yet I imagine that some of them felt the same way that I did. I was very optimistic about the potential for a new mahzor and at the same time anxious about

whether our adoption of this new spiritual tool would fulfill its potential. It was a few long months between placing our order—sending our large check to the Rabbinical Assembly (RA) and when we had the books in hand. Once we opened the boxes, I was relieved, once I heard from you about your experience of the mahzor after the holidays, I was elated. The new mahzor was everything we hoped it would be.

Many of your conversations with me shared two elements. After you told me what you liked most about the mahzor or how the mahzor had changed your experience of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, you then asked me, "When will we get a siddur like this?" So many of you asked me this question that I turned around after the holidays and called the RA and asked them "When will we get a siddur like this?" Over the next few months, apparently a number of rabbis and others called with the same question because by January the leadership of the RA announced that a new siddur. Siddur Lev Shalem was in the works.

How did the new mahzor make such a difference to so many of you and to our communal worship as well? *Mahzor Lev Shalem* offers a modern and direct translation of our Hebrew prayers. The translation is now a tool that can help you feel more connected to the prayers

whereas the old translation often felt like it got in the way. The layout of the mahzor is clear, so that following along is easier. The editors included directions for things like choreography so participation is more accessible. And in the margin there are notes that explore theological messages and challenges that are in the *tefilot* (prayers).

Good tools can change your life. A sharp, well balanced kitchen knife can transform the chore of slicing and dicing into a pleasure. Good tools don't fight our labors, they assist us, even amplifying our efforts. And if you are like me, when using a good tool, you might find yourself elevating your game. Every sign is that our new siddur will emulate our mahzor in being just this kind of tool.

Rabbi Ed Feld, the senior editor of Siddur Lev Shalem tells us "It (Mahzor Lev Shalem) 'stretches us in two directions: it is both more traditional and more contemporary than any previous Conservative mahzor.' Siddur Lev Shalem stretches us in that same way: we've looked at each service, thinking through how it was put together, how the tradition around it developed, what customs were dropped that can be reincorporated, and what contemporary ideas can respond to the text."

Siddur Lev Shalem will be published soon, and we look forward to integrating it into our worship as soon as we receive it. The RA is offering a significant discount to congregations that order the siddur by November 30th. To do so, we need to band together. The Ritual Committee has taken the lead, together pledging over a thousand dollars to this effort. Please join with us. If each Beth Israel Center family dedicated one Siddur Lev Shalem for \$36, we would have enough money to purchase all of the siddurim that we require.

President's Column

I Love it When a Plan Comes Together

"I love it when a plan comes together" was the tag line in The A-Team, an awful TV show in the mid-80s. Despite my commentary on the quality of that pop entertainment, the sentiment rings true. In this instance, I'm referring to the Strategic Plan created after the Board of Directors adopted the Mission and Vision for Beth Israel Center. Some context is important to appreciate what we are accomplishing together as a kahal.

The first order in planning for our future was a clear articulation of what we are striving to be. Our Mission and Vision statement was approved by the Board of Directors in the spring of 2010 after seeking input from members and contemplation of our values. It is worth revisiting from time to time. "Our **Mission:** To be a vibrant, caring spiritual home where we explore and nurture our unique Jewish identities. Together, we create a Kehillah (community) that is traditional, egalitarian and alive with celebration, learning, prayer, and tikkun olam (repairing the world). At Beth Israel Center, Conservative Judaism resonates with our contemporary lives, while our tradition grounds us meaningfully in the present moment." "Our Vision" consists in four components: Beit tefillah - House of Prayer, Beit Knesset - House of Gathering, Beit Midrash - House of Study, and Shmirat Beiteinu - Caring for our Home. Each component is defined in the statement and is published on the BIC website.

With our lofty mission established, a Strategic Plan Committee was formed to figure out ways to implement the Mission and Vision. The Committee created an action plan. Some items could be implemented immediately and others would take substantial planning and energy. According to the Plan, the "bigpicture objectives" are:

1) Move ahead with a building project to renovate our deteriorating facilities and proved a sustainable model for the next generation. 2) Ensure that Beth Israel Center has appropriate staff who could be responsible for, among other things, financial resource development (including outreach and membership

recruitment) and volunteer coordination.
3) Evaluate and develop sustainable financial resources, including increasing membership and expanding endowment funds

to buffer against



temporary reductions in current revenue streams.

As I reported at the annual Membership meeting, we can check number 1 off the list and we are working on two and three. At the first Board of Directors meeting of this year, we agreed that our goal will be to return to the Strategic Plan to develop and implement operational plans to reach identified goals. There are many facets to the Plan and we will need to prioritize where we spend our energy and resources. We will also evaluate where modifications may be necessary. Some items are mundane when compared to a building renovation, but all are important to sustaining our Mission and Vision.

We should be proud of what we have accomplished together in recent years and excited about what lies ahead. In other words, "I love it when a plan comes together." Let's be clear, all the A-Team had to do was drive around in a van looking for trouble in need of a self-righteous solution; that solution usually involved blowing something up. We are tasked with a more deliberate and durable objectives. I think we are up to the challenge.

### Talmud Torah Transformation in the Works

After a series of community listening sessions and discussions, many collaborations and proposals, as well as a unanimous vote of support by our Board of Directors, we are excited and thrilled to announce that the Beth Israel Center Talmud Torah will transform to be a Shabbat-centered school in Fall 2016. We believe that this innovative change will allow us to put a renewed focus on Parshat haShavua (weekly Torah readings) and other related Jewish texts in an age- and developmentally appropriate manner. This will also give our school a greater emphasis on praying as an experience rather than learning prayer as an academic subject. And it will enable us to enact a centuries old value: Jews gather on Shabbat.

Through a grant from The Kallah Project, we will be sponsoring a series of Shabbatonim to further our vision of a Shabbat-centered community. Shabbatonim incorporate some of education's and community building's best practices into one 25 hour (plus!) program. We will gather together to eat, drink, socialize, pray, learn and experience Shabbat and all that it has to offer us here in our beautiful new

Meet Your Leadership

Beth Israel Center's Board of Directors sets policies consistent with our Mission and Vision and assures that our committees and professional staff work in concert with those policies. The Board is also responsible for our budget and fiscal wellbeing. You should know who is governing your synagogue, so we are introducing a few Board members in each issue of the Centerite.

Rick Ezell, VP - Ritual

When did you join the congregation and why? I joined in August 2009, having just moved back to Madison after living in Albany, N.Y., for nine years. I was very

involved in my synagogue there and was looking for an egalitarian, traditional Conservative synagogue.



Tell us a little bit about yourself. I live on the near west side with my wife, Kristen, a professor at UW. We have no kids but have always had dogs. We currently have a sweet mixed-breed named Sadie that we adopted three years ago from a rescue group in Elgin, Ill. Kristen and I are avid road cyclists. We also love art, visiting museums, and collecting art. I have been working as a statistician at Colony Brands in Monroe, Wis., since January 2011. My primary responsibility is

building the predictive models that target our catalog mailings.

What prepared you to serve on the BIC Board of Directors? In Albany, I served on committees of various Jewish organizations and of my synagogue. Over the years I took on more leadership responsibilities. When we left in the summer of 2009 for Madison, I was serving on the boards of Federation, Jewish Family Services, and our local Jewish assisted living/nursing home. When asked to serve here, I said "yes" right away, not because I thought I was qualified in any special way but because I think it is our obligation, and honor, to serve the community when asked.

What exemplifies the ethos of BIC for you? Participation. Coming from a larger congregation where relatively few wanted to read Torah, I was, and continue to be, amazed at the number of wonderful readers we have here. I'm also excited about how many younger congregants read so beautifully.

Name one thing that may surprise people about you. Although I earned a Masters in Stats and work as statistician, math is not my first love. I also have Master's degrees in Greek and Latin, and in German. I love ancient languages. While a graduate student at Berkeley I was a member of a decades-old club which met once a month to translate Old Icelandic sagas - and eat and drink.

Laurie Nagus, At-Large Director

When did you join the congregation? We joined in 2000, when I was pregnant with Moira. We were looking for a Conservative shul because that's what I grew up with.

Tell us a little bit about yourself. We live in the Westmorland neighborhood. My daughter Moira is a 9th grader at West High School, and Rhiannon is a 7th grader at Madison Waldorf School, where I worked until very recently. I loved the work and the people; it was just time for a change. My husband Paul professes at UW.



Before re-joining the Board this year, what else have you done at BIC? I started on the Festivals Committee not long after we joined and became involved with the Membership Committee in 2004, which I co-chaired for several years and was the VP-Membership 2007-2013. I've also sat as the Membership Committee liaison to the Talmud Torah committee and am currently on the TT Committee working with our amazing TT director. I also like to hang out in the kitchen.

When asked to rejoin the Board, did you say yes right away? I did. Our shul is full of great people who are engaged in our synagogue in so many ways...making the Shabbat morning services run smoothly, joining our minyanim to show support for people needing to say kaddish, keeping the halls humming with activities throughout the week, reaching out to the wider community- the social action committee for example... they are all thoughtful people doing their best in the best interests of Beth Israel Center. I want to be a part of that.

Name one thing that may surprise people about you. I foolishly and willingly threw myself out of a plane. Never again. Paul loved it.

Howard Bregman, At-Large Director

When did you join the congregation? I joined BIC in 2011 because I was staring into the abyss of fatherhood.

Tell us a little bit about yourself. I live in Middleton with my wife Heidi, step-daughter Mara, who is 14, Ethan, 6, and Louis, 5. We have no pets as I am allergic to almost everything. I like gardening but am not very good at it, love listening to jazz, and am an avid genealogist. I grew up in Philadelphia and went to Sam Gellman's rival high school, then moved to Baltimore for college where I intersected with Matt Banks, returned to



Philadelphia, then lived in LA for 4 years, in Chicago for 10, and then to Madison. We moved to Middleton from Madison, partly because I find Madison too liberal politically. I am not particularly conservative, but not that liberal either. I moved here 10 years ago to work at Epic, having previously practiced as a pediatrician in Chicago area hospitals.

What is your favorite thing to do at BIC? Yom Kippur services. I find it to be very meaningful and cleansing. I could listen to Rabbi Diamond all day long, and do.

Tell us a story that exemplifies the ethos of BIC for you. I grew up in a Conservative shul just outside of Philadelphia -- the shul where my parents went to Hebrew School and first met. It had about 1400 families at its peak. Shabbat services featured an organ played by the Cantor's wife, a professional choir, and a cavernous sanctuary. When I was Bar Mitzvah I was taken to the same men's store that every other boy was taken to, got a new suit, and had my photo taken for the ad for the store in the Jewish paper. I split the day with another boy, and when it was over we went to a country club and had a large luncheon with a live band. The bandleader introduced me in front of this large group and had me do a Johnny Carson golf swing. This taught me the importance of suits, country clubs, and Johnny Carson. I never learned to daven Musaf. I greatly appreciate the ways that Beth Israel is different than my boyhood shul. However, I still don't feel comfortable coming to shul on Shabbat without a suit on.

Name one thing that may surprise people about you. I taught swing dance to hundreds of people in Chicago over the years, and I even taught many couples to dance for their wedding. I have been dancing for more than 25 years.

Making the Minyan

Maintaining a daily minyan, particularly for those who are in mourning or marking the anniversary of a loved one's death, is important for our community. Being a part of a minyan and saying Kaddish, or being counted in a minyan that allows a friend to say Kaddish, makes us a link in a spiritual chain. We come together to recognize these losses through words that have been uttered for this purpose for two millennia. The essence of our daily prayers is to renew our connection to God, including in moments of loss and times of gratitude.

While many of us can relate to these thoughts and understand them as ideals and even core values of a traditional Jewish community, very few of us — often fewer than the required 10 to say Kaddish — regularly attend our morning and evening minvanim at Beth Israel.

Many congregants have said they'll come when they know they're needed. To let each member know when s/he is particularly needed, we are asking each family to send at least one Jewish adult (over 13) to our morning and evening minyanim as often as possible during two assigned calendar weeks each year, beginning on Sunday and ending with Shabbat. Assignments are mailed out 4-6 weeks in advance with an email reminder the week before your assigned week. They are also posted on our website, and our office has a listing.

If you are unavailable during your week, consider swapping with a friend, or pick another week that works better for you.

Please come. You are needed.
