#### Rosh Hashana begins Wednesday evening, September 24.

Services this year will be held at First Congregational Church, at the corner of University Ave. and Breese Terrace. More information, including a ticket order form, will be mailed in August.

- Rosh Hashana services will begin at 5:45pm on Wednesday, Sept. 24 and at 8:00am on both days of Rosh Hashana — Thursday and Friday, Sept. 25 and 26.
- Yom Kippur services will begin at 5:45pm on Friday, Oct. 3 and at 9:00am on Saturday, Oct. 4.
- High Holiday Youth Programming will be offered for children in kindergarten through 7th grade on both days of Rosh Hashana and on Yom Kippur. These programs begin at 10:30am.
- Preschool Family Services are geared to families with preschool-aged children.
   They begin at 11:00am and last about an hour on both days of Rosh Hashana and on Yom Kippur.

Prayer can do a number of things. Prayer can help us to transcend ourselves. It can help us focus our attention on an important idea, concept or need. Prayer can build empathy in us for others. It can remind us of our blessings and the petty nature of most of our problems. Prayer can raise awareness in individuals and in communities. It can focus the community on the needs of an individual and it can focus a disparate community on needs we all feel. When we pray, we can accomplish one or all of these goals. We will receive more benefit from our prayers as individuals and as a

community the more effort and consideration we put into it.

When we sing a nigun and the words to a Mi-Sh-Beirach L'Cholim, a prayer on behalf of people who are ill, our voices join together. That simple act helps us to join in prayer with others and to transcend our selves. Singing together in this moment prepares us for what is to come. Names of people who are suf-

fering will be shared with the congregation. Some have been heard week in and week out, uttered by the same voices week after week. Others are new and draw special attention and some become conspicuous through their absence. The first time a name is no longer said can be just as stark as the first time it is shared with the community.

As is our custom, I pause at the appropriate place in the prayer for people who are present in the congregation to share the name of a friend or loved one who is

ill. I begin on the right side of the kahal and as my eyes meet the eyes of people who want to add a person's name to our communal prayer, they say that name out loud. In that moment of sharing, this person has opened themselves to the congregation. They have said, "I have a need." It might be a need to share their worries with our community, it might be the need to focus their energy towards hope instead of despair. It might be because they want the congregation to have the opportunity to express its concern for them and their loved one. Or it might be because they do

not know what else to

do.

Recently we have been engaged with the question of whether congregants who are not able to be present on Shabbat morning should be able to have a name added to this prayer on their behalf. The Ritual Committee and I have worked together to find a way to both extend this opportunity to the membership of our community who might not be present on a particular Shabbat while at the same time protecting the intimate

and powerful nature of the moment during our worship when the people present do open themselves up through their shar-

Some congregations allow for congregants to call or email their shul office to ask that a name be added to the prayer on Shabbat even though they (the person making the request) will not be in shul. This was our custom until a few years ago. And like a number of other congregations, the Ritual Committee and I recognized that this custom was getting to be burdensome to the kahal assembled on Shabbat morning. The list had gotten so long, sometimes because people were quick to add a name, but not so quick to request it be taken off. We often found that we had been adding a person's name to our communal prayer who had either recovered or worse, had died.

Together, the Ritual Committee and I have decided on the following way for our members who can't be in shul themselves to have a prayer said for their ill friend or loved one, while at the same time avoiding the list becoming burdensome or even a prayer in vain when we pray for people who do not need it: We will create the list anew each week. To add a name, please call (608-256-7763)

or email office@bethisraelcenter.org (subject: prayer for the ill) by Friday at 11:00am to have a name added to the names said by those present on that Shabbat morning. The following week we will start over again.

Now, congregants can have a prayer for healing said for a friend or loved one even if they cannot make it to shul on the particular Shabbat, and it will ensure the integrity of our communal prayer.

#### From Beth Copelovitch:

My family and I have returned from a fascinating year in Germany and we are thrilled to be back here in our home, community and shul. While we were in Berlin we had the opportunity to be active in the Oranienburgerstrasse schul, which meets at the iconic Neue Synagoge, the only Masorti (Conservative) congregation in Berlin. While I was mostly taking the year off to guide my family through the ups and downs of our year abroad (and there were both!), I had the privilege of working one-on-one with a conversion student throughout the year. Many things opened my eyes this year,



but watching my student and her young family find their way into the Jewish community made a true impact on me.

Many of us practice Judaism in our homes for the children. We are often so focused on the generations to come -- our children, their children, the continuity of the Jewish people -- that we forget to have our own, adult relationship with religion. Our children will learn the most when they see us taking Judaism seriously, struggling with learning something new, taking on a new mitzvah practice, or making a commitment to the community through prayer or tzedakah. I hope to continue providing opportunities for our community to learn, teach and struggle together and that, like my student in Berlin, more and more adults will build a mature relationship with Judaism.

Early in the demolition phase. The original foyer was still standing, but the coatroom, lounge, and sanctuary had come down.

In May and June, we demolished the eastern half of our building and gutted the western half. That means our former sanctuaries, offices, bathrooms, kitchens, and parts of a few classrooms have been completely removed from the site. We also demolished the two houses we owned on Randall Ave. (Don't worry, the student tenants had safely moved

We transitioned from demolition to active construction in July.

## Making the Minyan

Maintaining a daily minyan, particularly for those who are in mourning or marking the anniversary of a loved one's death, is important for our community. Being a part of a minyan and saying Kaddish, or being counted in a minyan that allows a friend to say Kaddish, makes us a link in a spiritual chain. We come together to recognize these losses through words that have been uttered for this purpose for two millennia. The essence of our daily prayers is to renew our connection to God, including in moments of loss and times of gratitude.

While many of us can relate to these thoughts and understand them as ideals and even core values of a traditional Jewish community, very few of us — often fewer than the required 10 to say Kaddish — regularly attend our morning and evening minvanim at Beth Israel.

Many congregants have said they'll come when they know they're needed. To let each member know when s/he is particularly needed, we are asking each family to send at least one Jewish adult (over 13) to our morning and evening minyanim as often as possible during two assigned calendar weeks, each beginning on Sunday and ending with Shabbat. Assignments are mailed out about 6 weeks in advance with an email reminder the week before your assigned week. They are also posted on our website, and our office has a listing.

Please come. You are needed.
