# Thoughts from the Rabbi...

A New Year: A New You! Deepen Your Experience of Yom Kippur.

I begin to prepare in earnest for the High Holidays towards the end of the summer. Writing sermons and planning teachings for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur



triggers me to reflect and think deeply about my past year. What triggers you to begin your spiritual reflection? Is it buying the brisket? Making the soup? Sending out invitations? Walking into the

sanctuary? For most Jews who are not congregational rabbis, Rosh Hashanah is designed to do this--to stir our emotional

and spiritual pots.

The days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, alternatively called the Days of Awe or the *aseret yamei teshuvah*, are a time given to us to begin to reflect and sort out what Rosh Hashanah has stirred up. I find them to be fundamental to my preparations for Yom Kippur. No matter how much I have been studying, writing and preparing--davening, studying and being together with you in our sanctuary, spending time with my family around the table, these activities raise different thoughts and awareness in me and bring home the import of the moment.

The aseret yamei teshuvah is when somehow the different reflections and thoughts that have been bouncing around in my mind get sorted and winnowed down to a few that I focus on throughout the 25 hours of Yom Kippur. A few go away because I figure them out. Many go away because I have a limited ability to focus on important issues and can only handle a few at a time. The relationship between how much time I am able to invest during the aseret yamei teshuvah doing so is invariably in a linear relationship to how meaningful my Yom Kippur will be.

During this busy time of year, any moment I am able to set aside for

reflection is precious. I cherish every opportunity I get to think deeply about my year of work, my year as a husband, father, child, sibling, friend, mensch. When I do it well, it all comes together on Yom Kippur. This year I am looking forward to two new opportunities to do so and I hope that you will join me for them.

On the afternoon of Shabbat Shuva (September 19th) from 2:00pm - 5:00pm, we will hold a mindfulness mini-retreat that I will co-lead with Matt Banks. We will use deep exploration of three highlights from the Yom Kippur liturgy as foundational texts for mindfulness practice and meditation. Participants will gain new understandings of some key texts of Yom Kippur and will have opportunities to focus on important issues for self reflection.

A second opportunity will follow in the tradition of the Kabbalists of Tzfat. who used to immerse in the mikveh before every Shabbat and holiday as a way of marking their transition from one week to another, and from their engagement with the troubles of daily existence to their experience of the divine on holidays. Immersing in the mikveh before Yom Kippur highly exemplifies this practice. It is a moment of privacy and of intention when you can focus on the year that was and your hopes for the year to come. This year we will follow in their tradition on Sunday (for women) and Monday (for men) evenings, September 20th and 21st, beginning at 7:00pm. Each evening will begin with some learning about mikveh, exploration of kavanot (short intentional texts) and continue with opportunities to immerse in our beautiful new mikveh and to socialize with friends.

I am already looking forward to finding spiritual renewal together with you as we celebrate the new year in our new Beth Israel Center.

# President's Column Show Me Your Budget

The Board of Directors unanimously approved a balanced budget at our June meeting. This might seem like a mundane order of business to report in the Centerite proceeding the High Holidays. On the contrary, balancing the budget is central to our Board's duties and to the health of our organization. As Joe Biden famously quips, "Don't tell me what you value, show me your budget and I will tell you what you value."

The past several years have presented challenges to the budgeting process based on significant unknowns; the implications of our construction project on the operating budget being primary among them. The budget process relied on best estimates and

tapped into our Budget Reserve Fund at the outset to relieve the financial pressure. These were necessary measures and were meant to be temporary.

The Board committed to beginning this fiscal year with a balanced budget. The Budget

Committee sought input from staff and each committee. They were asked what they would do with more money and how they could get by with less. As expected, the allocation requests put the first draft budget deep in the red. The Budget Committee then began the process of internal debate, creative cyphering and communication with staff and committees. A draft budget was presented to the Board at the May meeting so that everyone had ample time to review and digest it before the vote at the June meeting.

I am devoting considerable ink to this in order to emphasize the deliberate nature of the process. Everyone comes to the table with values and issues we want to promote. Each is worthy in its own right. The budget process is how we prioritize and recognize the work that is yet to be done. We continue to face

significant unknowns as we begin this fiscal year in a new building and with implementation of new programming. The goal is for the process to be transparent and iterative. How well we anticipated

operating cost for this year will inform next year's budget process.

# From the Executive Director's Desk

## Why Require High Holiday Tickets?

By the end of August, each Beth Israel Center member will receive a membership renewal form, which is also the High Holiday ticket order form.



Why do we require tickets for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur? Four reasons come to mind.

1) It's a security precaution.

While we wish we didn't have to be so cautious, especially on the holiest days of our year, the reality is that in today's world, we need to be vigilant about who is in our building.

- 2) It helps us gauge how many chairs to set up. One of the special things about our new sanctuary seating is that we can modify the number of seats and the size of the room depending on anticipated crowd size. Requiring tickets tells us how many chairs and how much space we'll need.
- 3) Requiring everyone who plans to attend our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services to contact the office (to request tickets) helps us identify

visitors and prospective members so that we can be gracious hosts.

4) Selling tickets generates income necessary to continue doing things like bringing Rabbi Eliezer Diamond in as our High Holiday Hazzan, providing apples and honey at our Tashlikh Nosh, buying glo-sticks for Havdalah at the end of Yom Kippur, and other important synagogue functions.

All that said, if you forget your tickets, we'll still let you in. Simply check in with an usher, as each usher will have a list of all the ticket holders. No ticket and not on the list? Find Cheri at the check-in table. She'll ask for your name and some identifying information.

In the end, while we require tickets for security, seating logistics, and fundraising purposes, the most gratifying outcome of our ticket policy for me is that I meet new people each year. And, really, that's what Beth Israel Center is all about -- making connections -- at High Holiday time and throughout the year.

## Talmud Torah—Thinking About a Change

After considering what makes our community strong and our education program unique, the Talmud Torah committee, the Executive Committee and the staff began thinking about what can make us even better. At this time, we are seeking community input as we consider a change to our Talmud Torah schedule. Please join us to discuss a proposal to move to a Shabbat-centered school, which would begin in September 2016.

Dessert and discussions will be held on August 13 at 7:30pm on the east side at Jordy and Jessie Loeb's home and on August 27 at 7:30pm on the west side at Jennie and Matt Edes-Pierotti's home. Please join us at one of these sessions to ask questions about scheduling and curriculum and to let us know how a change might affect your family.

Several Conservative congregations have moved to the Shabbat school model with great success. We are hoping to build a Shabbat community and bring the students along in their prayer lives. While our Talmud Torah does an excellent job of teaching prayer, words, meaning and personal connection;

praying is a different story. By creating a program in which children come together to learn and pray at a meaningful, appropriate time (experiential education) we



expect to further our vision and mission to make Talmud Torah a "...vibrant center of Jewish learning, spirituality, community and experience that will enhance young people's connections to Judaism while providing the building blocks of a comprehensive Jewish education."

# Meet Your Leadership

Beth Israel Center's Board of Directors sets policies consistent with our Mission and Vision and assures that our committees and professional staff work in concert with those policies. #### Matt Banks, President-Elect

When did you join the congregation? In the late 1990s. I was a member of another congregation and wanted a richer Jewish educational experience for Jess, and also



something more like what I grew up with, which was a Conservative shul very similar to BIC.

Tell us a little bit about yourself. I moved to the near east side of Madison 27 years ago and immediately fell in love with the neighborhood and the city. I value being able to walk or ride my bike to grocery stores, restaurants, music venues and work, and I enjoy being so close to the lake. My two kids (Jess and Maya) are grown and most of my family still live in the Motherland (New Jersey). For fun, besides reading, which I do voraciously (fiction

and non-fiction; currently: *Infinite Jest* by David Foster Wallace), I love to be outdoors, putting myself outside my comfort zone....bike riding, backpacking, swimming, winter sports to name a few. A spiritual cornerstone of my life is my meditation practice, alone and with Madison Tergar. It's been very satisfying to integrate meditation into my Jewish practice, allowing one to strengthen the other.

And your work? I am an Associate Professor of neuroscience in the UW SMPH. Every once in a while an experiment works and we get to observe something that no one else has ever seen before. I still get goosebumps when that happens.

What has prepared you for service on the BIC Board? I have served on the board of the Madison Jewish Community Day School for the past four years, as well as various committees at the University. My father was president of our synagogue when I was growing up, and also served on the board of the Solomon Schechter Day School I attended from grades 2-12, so perhaps it's genetic. Also, I have been on the Ritual Committee for 7 years, and regularly attend and lead Shabbat and holiday services.

*Name one thing that may surprise people about you.* I'm actually pretty shy. Small talk is a challenge for me, as my default setting is to assume that people couldn't possibly be interested in the minutiae of my life. But I'm learning...

#### Livia Asher, Finance Committee

When did you join the congregation? Around 5 or 6 years ago. I was looking for a Conservative congregation and BIC felt right. And my book group all happened to be



BIC members. I didn't join when I moved to Madison (nearly 10 years ago) because my kids were still in NYC, and I went back there for the holidays. Then my kids moved away from NYC -- my daughter and her family are in Chicago; my son and his new wife are in DC -- and BIC was the natural choice.

Tell us a little bit about yourself. I retired five years ago from a career centered in the investment world. I started out as a stock analyst in the mid 1970s and later moved to the "client" side of the business, investing pension funds. I was recruited to Madison to

work at CUNA Mutual and was a little skeptical of moving here, but it all worked out wonderfully. I'm a committed downtowner, enjoying a short walk to Overture, the farmers' market and campus. In retirement, I've taken up hiking and biking and travel. I've been fortunate to find a group of like-minded women to pursue these activities. I've also joined the Boards or committees of many Jewish organizations in town including BIC, Federation and JSS. Besides serving on BIC's Board, I monitor our investment portfolios and am the intermediary between our funds manager and the Board. This fits in perfectly with my former professional jobs in the field.

What do you like to do at Beth Israel Center? I attend lectures and talks and avail myself of some of the adult ed offerings. I enjoy catching up with friends and acquaintances at and after services and Shabbat dinners.

For you, what exemplifies the ethos or values of Beth Israel Center? Following the awful attack on the Sikh temple a few years ago, BIC invited members of the Sikh community to participate with us in worship and in solidarity.

When you were asked to join the BIC Board, did you say yes right away? I did. I had just retired and was eager to use some of my skills, mainly in finance and investments, where they would be helpful. The community welcomed me when I moved to Madison, and I was pleased and honored to give back any way I could.

*Name one thing that may surprise people about you.* I was born in Israel and came to the US as a small child. And, alas, I do not know any Hebrew.

#### David Baum, Youth Committee Chair

When did you join the congregation and why? I grew up in England attending a small Orthodox shul, which I never found very comfortable - though I always

loved the home traditions. Through my wife, Ruth, who I met as a graduate student in St. Louis, I became exposed to Conservative Judaism, and found it much more to my liking. We first connected with BIC in 1991 when Ruth and I moved to Madison as post-docs. We were looking for a traditional, egalitarian minyan and were thrilled to find such a great, participatory community. After a seven-year hiatus in Boston, we returned in 2001, kids in tow, and were delighted to reconnect as members.

# Making the Minyan

Maintaining a daily minyan, particularly for those who are in mourning or marking the anniversary of a loved one's death, is important for our community. Being a part of a minyan and saying Kaddish, or being counted in a minyan that allows a friend to say Kaddish, makes us a link in a spiritual chain. We come together to recognize these losses through words that have been uttered for this purpose for two millennia. The essence of our daily prayers is to renew our connection to God, including in moments of loss and times of gratitude.

While many of us can relate to these thoughts and understand them as ideals and even core values of a traditional Jewish community, very few of us — often fewer than the required 10 to say Kaddish — regularly attend our morning and evening minyanim at Beth Israel.

Many congregants have said they'll come when they know they're needed. To let each member know when s/he is particularly needed, we are asking each family to send at least one Jewish adult (over 13) to our morning and evening minyanim as often as possible during two assigned calendar weeks each year, beginning on Sunday and ending with Shabbat. Assignments are mailed out 4-6 weeks in advance with an email reminder the week before your assigned week. They are also posted on our website, and our office has a listing.

Please come. You are needed.
