Thoughts from the Rabbi...

Get Naked at Beth Israel Center

Our new, beautiful, spa-like Sylvia Grunes Mikvah is a great resource for our community that we are only beginning to tap to its fullest potential. Having a mikvah that is open to all for the traditional purposes of



conversion and *niddah*, (ritual immersion by women and sometimes their partners to mark the end of their menstrual cycle) is a necessity. Beyond these classic uses, our new mikvah has so much more potential. The title of this column

is a double entendre, although not a bawdy one. A person enters the mikvah naked—that is, wearing no clothing. Our mikvah is a private, spiritual space where you can be naked and comfortable in these *mayim hayim*, living waters. The physical nakedness makes it possible for these living waters to completely envelop each person who immerses.

Over the past few decades, Jews have begun to use the mikvah for purposes other than conversion and *niddah*. The private space where the spiritual waters of the mikvah completely hold you offer a safe and accepting space where we each can be

I was not raised in a community with a mikvah. When I considered it as part of Jewish practice at all, it was as belonging to another world where marriages look much different than my own. The mikvah might be for other women, but certainly not for me.

However, when I heard BIC was building a mikvah, a beautiful and welcoming part of our communal home, I was intrigued about whether it could be used for non-halachically prescribed purposes. I have chronic PTSD arising from experiencing prolonged sexual violence, and my relationship to my community, my spirituality, and my body is complicated. Men and women in Reform and Conservative communities with similar histories have in recent years been exploring how to use the mikvah as part of their journeys to reconnect to that which has felt out of reach, and I wondered out loud to the Rabbi if maybe I could try using our mikvah in that way too. spiritually naked. We can shed the clothing protection of ego and personal narrative to expose ourselves to ourselves. And in this moment we can find acceptance and healing.

Today, immersing to mark the end of chemo-therapy, survival of surgery, receiving the final decree in a divorce or generically to seek healing from something that pains is becoming ever more common. The testaments of people who have immersed often reveal how skeptical at first, they were surprised at the power of the experience and how it helped them. One of our own community members has agreed to share reflections on her experience (*see below*).

Our mikvah is open every day except Shabbat and holidays; please contact the office at least one business day in advance to make an appointment.

This year we will again be setting aside two nights immediately before Yom Kippur (October 9th for women and 10th for men) for learning about and experiencing the mikvah. Seize the opportunity that this ancient tradition affords to find solace, healing and spiritual commitment for the coming year. Shalom,

For the last year, he and I have been meeting to study texts, understand the traditions and history of ritual immersions, and ultimately begin to create a ritual practice that both speaks to me and is conjunctive with our traditional understandings and uses of the mikvah. During my now monthly immersions I marvel at the space out of time that is our mikvah and mark the changes in myself as I move along my healing journey. This private ritual in a public space has provided me a visceral and emotional connection to our BIC family. Our community provided a room where I can pray, scream, cry and feel like I am very much not alone. What started as an abstract concept of things "other Jews do" became a central part of my Jewish experience. Thank you to BIC for supporting the building of this space and a heartfelt thank you to the Rabbi for exploring new and transformative uses for it.



President's Column

Looking Forward to Looking Back

A strong slate of officers and directors will be presented (and presumably elected) at the annual meeting on September 13. Matt Banks and the officers on the 2016 Executive Committee are deeply committed to the mission and success of Beth Israel Center. At the risk of omission, I want to highlight some of the efforts by our officers. Cynthia Hirsch ascended to the coveted post of Immediate Past President after serving a third year as President. Three years; enough said! Tenacity is a small part of her presidential portfolio. Cynthia's long-term commitment to BIC and heimishkeit made her uniquely qualified to lead us through a major building project and the accompanying displacement. President Hirsch also led many less visible efforts including working with the Personnel Committee to develop and implement a personnel policy manual.

Rick Ezell has been a steady hand as Vice President of Ritual. We can't recognize and thank the Ritual Committee enough for the work they do week in and week out to plan our services. High Holiday planning is work enough, but in the past two years it was all the more so. In 2014 the Ritual Committee and our Rabbi planned High Holiday services in a church. In 2015 they planned services in our new sanctuary . . . while it was being built. Services both years had the continuity we expected and the

enthusiasm we hoped for. Rick will transition to President-Elect; a demonstration of his commitment to Beth Israel Center and to the Jewish community.

Don Miner continues as our veteran officer,



Vice President of Finance and volunteer bookkeeper. Need I say more? Of course I do. Don has been critical in maintaining our financial health sometimes with not enough help and sometimes, probably, with too much help. We have endeavored to formalize our budget cycle so that each year will help inform decisions for the coming budget year. This involves meetings, debates and more meetings. In between budget cycles, Don works tirelessly to maintain our books.

Jennie Edes-Pierotti worked closely with our Education Director to maintain our Talmud Torah program as we moved from our old building to our temporary locations and back to our new building. Not content to rest on her accomplishments, Jennie and the Talmud Torah Committee have been working diligently to re-think how we deliver our Talmud Torah education. After significant research, community meetings and planning, BIC will implement a Shabbat-centered program this fall. Jennie demonstrates her commitment to developing our educational program as she continues as V.P. of Education next year.

What's New?

As I write this, I'm at Camp Ramah in Conover, WI, listening to campers playing, learning and just hanging out together. It's my first time here for any length of time and the whole experience-the fresh air, the Hebrew atmosphere, the joy and the rhythm of the day from *tefillot* in the morning to reading in the youngest bunk at bedtime (along with the tuna sandwiches) are really pulling me to go be a part of it. Instead, I'm a happy observer, reading and working in a sunny spot watching campers (*our* campers--campers from Madison are *everywhere* here!).

This summer, as always, I'm reading several books related to Jewish education and education in general. This week's book, *It's Our Challenge: A Social Entrepeneurship Approach to Jewish Education* by Jonathan Mirvis, is helping me understand exactly how important our innovative Shabbat-centered school will be for our community and our future. Mirvis likens educational change and social entrepeneurship to the famous biblical story of Jacob's ladder in which Jacob dreams that a ladder is placed on the ground, with

its "...head reaching the heavens. And the angels of God were ascending and descending" (Genesis 28:12). He claims that "In order to keep one's feet on the

ground, a person needs to be immersed in the current reality... By contrast, in order to reach for the heavens, a person needs to have a higher belief that transcends the current situation and aspires



to achieve seemingly unattainable goals... In navigating the future, a person should always be rooted in the present, while his or her head constantly challenges the status quo and dreams of a new reality" (Mirvis xvii).

Thank you for dreaming with me this past year, while keeping me firmly rooted in reality. Our efforts will be worth it.

Meet Your Leadership

Emily Desai, At-large Director, Incoming VP-Membership

When did you join the congregation and why? I joined Beth Israel Center in 2007 when I moved to Madison. During and after college, I was a vagrant, but after I got married, I joined a congregation wherever I lived. I lived in places with small Jewish communities and I felt a responsibility to supporting Judaism in the place I was. How else do *Nerot Tamid* stay lit aside from our commitment as individuals?



Tell us a little bit about yourself. My husband, Ankur, and I have three daughters, Maya, Lela and Sarita. My brother, Kyle, moved to Stoughton in 2014 and my parents followed soon after. Seven of the eight of us love to ski. I've been a special education teacher since 2005 and taught at West High School since 2010. Educating students with disabilities and their peers gives me the chance to learn humility daily, a trait I'll attempt to carry with me to the Board. I've spent Saturday mornings chilling with the eight and under set since 2008. We have amazing discussions together that always give me new ways of seeing. I am fortunate to live within walking distance of not just BIC, but also my workplace, Ankur's workplace, my parents' home, and two of the public schools in our attendance area.

What has prepared you for service on the BIC Board? In college, I was the Loose Ends Coordinator for the Kosher-Halal Coop at Oberlin College. Twice. The first semester, meals were often bad and late, but members were happy. The second time the food was prompt and tasty, but everyone was grumpy with each other. I'm still trying to puzzle that one out, but I think it shows that satisfaction and the quality of programming aren't necessarily correlated.

Tell us a story that exemplifies Beth Israel Center for you. One Shabbat morning, I asked the Shorashim children what we should start with. One of them pointed to a blank page, so I asked what was there. They said a midrash and defined midrash as a story with a story within a story. For many months after that, the kindergarten through second graders spun tales based on the week's parshah.

What do you hope to accomplish as a Board member? It's gonna be huge! But if it's not, I hope to participate in a smooth running congregation that meets the needs of its membership in a fiscally responsible way.

Name one thing that may surprise people about you. I have multiple sclerosis. Fortunately, my prognosis continues to look good, since I was diagnosed almost 17 years ago and have no disability.

Trudy Barash, At-large Director, Membership Committee

Beth Israel Center is precious to me for many reasons. Therefore, in place of answering the usual questions, I've decided to write about what Beth Israel Center has come to mean to me over the 44 years since I moved to Madison with Harvey, whose parents, Hilda and Abraham Barash, were among the founders of Beth Israel Center in 1948.

Harvey's parents became deaf due to childhood diseases untreated in Russia. They met in Sheboygan (a story in itself!), and at that time, had to be married at Madison's Workman's Circle, as they were refused a synagogue wedding because of their lack of 'language.' Therefore, it was incredibly moving when, in the mid 1970s, Rabbi Feinberg, recognizing that the Halachic meaning of 'language' had changed over time, suggested that the moment had come for Abe to be given an Aliyah. It was touching to see him ascend to the bimah. Abraham Barash, a deaf shoe repairman, signed the blessings in translation in broad, graceful strokes with his immense, strapping hands. After he finished the blessing,



the Torah reader, Mr. Rothblatt—a venerable scholar—fingerspelled A-M-E-N. Weeping could be heard throughout the congregation that day. Abe was called to the Torah many times after that, but no one who was there will forget his very first time.

Our four sons David, Jonathan, Joshua and Daniel were 7, 5, 3, and 1 years old when we moved back here in 1972, from Ft. Campbell, KY. The boys went through Talmud Torah and we remember bemoaning how naughty they all were during those years. But, as happens with all 12- and 13-year-olds, something miraculous occurs on the way to preparing to become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. The process itself becomes lifechanging— and it was especially so for the boys because of several remarkable people who happened to be passing through the university at that time.

Simcha Prombaum, who was working towards a Masters degree in the Business School and was our student cantor for several years, was a great tutor, made learning a joy and became a close family friend. Rafi Finkel was on the faculty in Computer Science during those years and was incredibly knowledgeable. When he learned that David had decided to become a Hazan, Rafi, together with Simcha, went out of their way to make tapes of the High Holiday and Festival services for him, as well as of the beautiful Piyutim within the services. (David has since tutored Rayla Temin from those very same tapes.) Our dear Deb Hoffman is still in touch with the boys. And finally Si Hellerstein, from all the way back then, is remembered by them for his radiant presence around the Torah—ever the teacher—gently correcting them on the use of a vowel or heartily congratulating them on a well-prepared reading. He's remembered, as well, for his extraordinary kindness.

Years later, in 1986, my mother came to live in Madison after my dad's death in Jerusalem (she had made Aliyah with my father 15 years before), and I offer profound thanks to the congregants of Beth Israel for embracing her. When she first met the women of Beth Israel Women's League, she was ready to dive right in to the matters at hand in a voice and volume that had worked for her all her adult life in New Jersey and during her childhood in Brooklyn. That wasn't QUITE the manner of the Midwest. Once that became clear to her, she pulled back and slowly, slowly began to gain the trust and admiration of people who came to know her. (Over the years she became great buddies with Jake Heifetz, another character worthy of a story.)

My mother could most often be found in the gift shop with lovely Sylvia Grunes. Annabelle found joy in ordering for the shop and inevitably overbought, so the stock was much larger than it should have been. But if you were looking for an exquisite Pesach plate or Kiddush cup, the Beth Israel gift shop was definitely the place to go. I've been told that she was an integral part of many children's Hebrew school experience—a kind of surrogate grandmother. Of course, she sold candy in the gift shop, and even ran up candy 'credit accounts.' These are some of the memories I call upon and am grateful for as I sit in our beautifully renovated sanctuary on a Shabbat morning. I'm delighted to serve on the Board at this moment in time.

K'hilat Chesed, Caring Community

As part of our commitment to our community, the Rabbi and members of Beth Israel Center have developed ways to support members at times of need. The Kindness List is one way in which we do that, providing meals to help people at times of stress—when recovering from illness, adjusting to the arrival of a new family member, coping with grief, or any other life challenges that mean a little extra help would be welcome.

Over the past several months Rabbi Ben-Gideon and several congregants have been meeting to develop an additional way to support our members, particularly those who are unable to participate in synagogue-based life. This includes members who are homebound, hospitalized, living in a nursing home or other institution, or otherwise unable to readily get to the synagogue. The result of these meetings is the development of the K'hilat Chesed (Caring Community) group. Members of this group will visit individuals who find it difficult or impossible to attend the synagogue. Visits by members of the K'hilat Chesed group are not meant to replace any

existing visits or services a member may already be receiving. Rather, these visits are intended to be social in nature, and to extend the warmth of our community to anyone in the congregation in any of those situations who feels they want someone from the congregation to visit them.

Anyone who would like a friendly visit from a member of the K'hilat Chesed group should contact Rabbi Ben-Gideon through the Beth Israel Center office-call (608) 256-7763 or email rabbi@bethisraelcenter.org. The Rabbi will disseminate relevant information to the group to facilitate the visit or visits. One of the group's members will make contact and make arrangements to visit whomever requests a visit. Members of the group have received training on maintaining privacy and confidentiality, and assure the membership that they look forward to extending the walls of the synagogue through home-based visits.

Making the Minyan

Maintaining a daily minyan, particularly for those who are in mourning or marking the anniversary of a loved one's death, is important for our community. Being a part of a minyan and saying Kaddish, or being counted in a minyan that allows a friend to say Kaddish, makes us a link in a spiritual chain. We come together to recognize these losses through words that have been uttered for this purpose for two millennia.

While many of us can relate to these thoughts and understand them as ideals and even core values of a traditional Jewish community, very few of us — often fewer than the required 10 to say Kaddish — regularly attend our morning and evening minyanim at Beth Israel.

Many congregants have said they'll come when they know they're needed. To let each member know when s/he is particularly needed, we are asking each family to send at least one Jewish adult (over 13) to our morning and evening minyanim as often as possible during two assigned calendar weeks each year, beginning on Sunday and ending with Shabbat. Assignments are mailed out 4-6 weeks in advance with an email reminder the week before your assigned week. They are also posted on our website, and our office has a listing. If you are unavailable during your week, consider swapping with a friend, or pick another week that works better for you.
