# Thoughts from the Rabbi...

### Time to Double Down!

There is a well-known scene in the cult-classic movie "Swingers" where the lead character is taught that when you are dealt an eleven in the game of Blackjack the proper move is to double down. Doubling down has a specific meaning in the game, doubling your wager, and has come to have idiomatic meaning in popular culture along the lines of significantly increasing a risk, investment, or other commitment.

As you will hopefully read in other sections of this Centerite, our community is not at a time of increased risk—quite the contrary. We are about to break ground on a building project to renew and revitalize our spiritual home. This project has been on our communal horizon since before I became your rabbi and we are all proud and excited to be able to complete it soon. So we do not need to double down on the building.

The details of our construction project are getting worked out as I write these words. By the time you read them, more will be known about how much we will have access to our building, and what other locations we might need to use during this time. We know that this work will be quite invasive and will undoubtedly affect our day to day, week to week and month by month activities. How we will function as a community in the months during demolition and construction is a very important concern.

We now look at another horizon, the date in the near future when our project will be complete and we daven for the first time in our new sanctuary. This is the time when we should double down on our commitment to community. It is not a time to sit back and wait, quite the contrary. We are a growing and vibrant community. This is the time to invest ourselves even more in congregational life to both help sustain us through these next months and also to build up our potential communal energy so that when we do walk through our new doors for the first time, our collective energy that has been building over the past years and now months, explodes forth and fills every nook and cranny of our beautifully revitalized and expanded space.

Ways to double down on Beth Israel Center in the coming months:

**Participate in a new or renewed way:** Help make the statement that we do need to wait for our new building to continue growing by learning to participate or lead a part of the Shabbat morning service that you have not done before, or not for a long time. This is the perfect time to ask Rayla to assign you another Torah reading after a hiatus.

**Come to class:** Beth Israel has a number of ongoing adult education classes and all of them will be continuing throughout the period of construction. Bring your voice to the discussion, learn a new skill or refine an old one. Our congregation has two on-going Talmud classes, our Beit Midrash, Hebrew and Yiddish and other classes—find one that speaks to you and join in.

**Come to daily minyan:** As we face the uncertainties and perhaps changed



location, our regular minyan goers would so appreciate the support and vote of confidence that having more members show up for minyan.

**Volunteer:** While we do not know exactly what kiddush on Shabbat morning will look like, we do know that we will need volunteers to help create it. Shabbat kiddish is a most important time in our communal life, when we get to check in with one another after a sometimes long and challenging week.

Become a greeter: This is a time when the uncertainty of a new environment or changing conditions will cause us to rely upon our greeters even more to ensure that those who

You WILL be able to find us. Your shul will not disappear behind construction barriers. We promise. Everyone is excited and plans are being made.

We do not yet know how long, if at all, we will be required to vacate the building....but the good news is: we WILL know that very soon. Maybe even by the time you are reading this. But whether you have to look for your Rabbi and educators and executive director and Shabbat morning programs ..... in another corner of the building or down the street in a borrowed space, there will be lots of signage and lots of notice....you WILL be able to find us.

And Purim will not be canceled. Nor will Passover, or Shavuot, or end of the year school traditions, or the Lag B'Omer barbecue or simchas or Shabbat morning prayers. We might walk through our doors are made to feel comfortable and a welcome addition to our community. The Talmud teaches us that it is more important to welcome the stranger than to welcome God. Help fulfill this important mitzvah.

We do not know how the next months will be. Now is the time to double down on all that makes our community so special. The promised land is on the horizon

# From the Building Committee Chair

Since the last Centerite came out in early November, the Building Committee has been incredibly busy with the design process. I wrote the following in the Fall 2013 Centerite:

The goal is to advance through Design Development in early 2014 so the architects can assemble construction development documents and put the project out for bids in late Winter.

I am pleased to report we have met our goal and stayed on schedule. In November and December, our architects, Paul Cuta and Marc Schelpfeffer from CaS4 Architecture, spent more than 50 hours in focus group meetings with congregants, honing design concepts related to how we will use our sacred spaces, social spaces, classrooms, kitchens, bathrooms, and offices. That intense six weeks of work lead to the presentation (on December 22) of the floor plans shown here.

In January, we selected CG Schmidt as our Construction Manager. We will devote the coming weeks to finalizing the design and getting ready for construction.

CG Schmidt, a family-owned company since 1920, is a leader in quality construction management, general construction, and design-build services in the Midwest. The company serves the markets of community, healthcare, educational, senior living, corporate, industrial and religious facilities. CG Schmidt's notable projects include the Milwaukee Art Museum's Calatrava Addition; Jewish Community Center in Milwaukee; Spectrum Brands New World Headquarters in Middleton; University of Wisconsin – Madison's New South Union and Carson Gulley Center; and Monroe Clinic Hospital in Monroe.

Our project includes a complete renovation of the west side of the building, and the east portion (the current sanctuaries, offices, library and lounges) will be removed and replaced with a slightly larger footprint. Structural components will be replaced, and the building systems will be updated including mechanical, electrical, plumbing and kitchen systems. The renovated building will offer reconfigured worship, study and gathering spaces to address the space needs for the congregation for generations to come. The renovations are intended to update this long-time beloved synagogue that has been part of the fabric of the Vilas Neighborhood since 1950. Demolition and construction will begin in the Spring of 2014.


It is exciting to think about what will be accomplished by the time the Spring Centerite is published. Our goals include: complete construction documents and solicit bids from subcontractors; obtain final City approval and permits; and finalize a construction schedule. As you read the next Centerite, BIC will have packed up for the transition, decided how much of our program can remain in the building during construction, made necessary temporary relocation arrangements and selected a location for 2014 High Holiday services.

It is a bit *chutzpadik* to put scheduling goals in writing, especially when many aspects are out of our control. Given the commitment and hard work of the Building Committee, BIC staff and focus group volunteers, I am confident we will stay on track and on schedule. I would like to thank the people listed to the left for their hard work over the past several months.

# Making the Minyan

Maintaining a daily minyan, particularly for those who are in mourning or marking the anniversary of a loved one's death, is important for our community. Being a part of a minyan and saying Kaddish, or being counted in a minyan that allows a friend to say Kaddish, makes us a link in a spiritual chain. We come together to recognize these losses through words that have been uttered for this purpose for two millennia. The essence of our daily prayers is to renew our connection to God, including in moments of loss and times of gratitude.

While many of us can relate to these thoughts and understand them as ideals and even core values of a traditional Jewish community, very few of us — often fewer than the required 10 to say Kaddish — regularly attend our morning and evening minyanim at Beth Israel.

Many congregants have said they'll come when they know they're needed. To let each member know when s/he is particularly needed, we are asking each family to send at least one Jewish adult (over 13) to our morning and evening minyanim as often as possible during one assigned calendar week, beginning on Sunday and ending with Shabbat. Assignments close to the date of this newsletter are in the sidebar on this page. Assignments are also posted on our website, and our office has a listing.

Please come. You are needed.

# Kabbalat Shabbat Initiative

Kabbalat Shabbat is one of the most beautiful times of the week. Every Friday night, as we transition from our weeks filled with work, school, and community activities, we have the opportunity to come together to welcome the peace of Shabbat.

The Beth Israel Center strategic plan, developed by the Board of Directors in 2010, prioritizes strengthening our congregational Kabbalat Shabbat observance. # Social Action

## Friends of Emerson School Initiative

Madison's joint synagogue social action organization, now known as Jewish Congregations for Social Justice (JCSJ), continues successfully to recruit and place new volunteers through Friends of Emerson School.

Among the ways we are supporting Emerson School so far are through the Chess Club (see the facing page), as Math Mentors, and by volunteering at the school's Tuesday Night Lights programs.

#### Math Mentors

The Emerson School math mentor program has been launched with many mentors beginning to meet with students. Currently, 18 mentors are working with 25 students in grades 2-5. Lisa Stein, math specialist at Emerson, has found it delightful to meet the volunteers and partner them with the students. Both adults and students are excited about the one-on-one meeting times--even looking forward to the math practice.

The volunteers have a wide range of experiences and ability with math students, but all are earnest and sincere in their desire to build a relationship with the students. Emerson's principal, math specialist and teachers are very excited about the math mentor program. Teachers (even new teachers) are confident with the content and activities to support mentors.

One important aspect of the program at Emerson is the method they have created to evaluate the success of math mentoring. The goal of partnering volunteers with students is to improve skills in understanding of math facts. The teachers are currently re-assessing students in the area of fact understanding for mid-year measures/report cards. Teachers and students will then set goals for facts based on this new evaluation. Appropriate routines and activities are already developed to enhance students' skills, and volunteers were trained on these activities. Many students will need extra one-to-one practice to "break the code". Others are working on becoming more fluent with composing and decomposing numbers within 10 or 20 (adding and subtraction) and yet others are working on skip counting to become fluent with multiplication. In the spring, students will be evaluated again to see the outcome of the math mentoring program.
