Thoughts from the Rabbi...

Welcome Back Home!

Yasher Koach to each and every member of the Beth Israel family! We did it! We made it through nine months of displacement. I don't know if the nine



months Rebecca was pregnant with the girls felt as long as the nine months we were wanderers outside of our building, but it's hard not to make the comparison. And now it is good to be home.

I say *Yasher Koach* to everyone because we all did a great job of holding it together while we were planning our project and then stepped it up while we were displaced. You each had to deal with a congregation that was functioning with some severe limitations and each and every one of you showed great patience and generosity towards the staff and towards each other. So *yasher koach* and thank you for helping us all to make it back.

One of the things that I most appreciate about Judaism is that you are never done. There is no level of spiritual accomplishment that one can arrive at where our tradition does not then say "very nice" and then kick us in the pants and say "...now hurry up and get going." There is always more to learn, a level of spirituality to experience or a moral sensitivity to develop that are beyond who we are in this very moment. And so too with community.

We have all enjoyed returning to our own space. The fact that our new building is so beautiful and functional only increases our joy. Now it is time to return to the arc of progress our community was on before we took this very productive detour. To do so, as a *kahal*, congregation, we must appreciate who we were before this

project that made it possible in the first place, who we have become through this process and who we want to be.

As we are all unique individuals, we would each answer the previous questions differently. One thing that brings many of us together and that we must be careful to protect is what social scientists refer to as "social capital," that communal feeling that characterizes so much of what we do. The currency of community is a precious one, especially in our day and age, and one of our primary struggles is to build and deepen it. Perhaps we have spent some of that capital in that past year and a half, and now it is time to return to building it in earnest.

We are back and getting on track. Look at all of the wonderful ways our community is growing and developing and all of the wonderful opportunities to grow yourself! This spring we will be offering a curriculum from the Melton Institute of Hebrew University on Jewish parenting that will hopefully be a only a taste as we prepare to bring the full Melton curriculum to Madison next year. This Spring we will also have the opportunity to study with three pioneers of Jewish Mindfulness, Rabbi Jordan Bendat-Appell, Professor Richie Davidson and Rabbi Alan Lew z"l. President's Column

Reset for 2015

I had an epiphany on Christmas Day. I realize this is not a typical topic sentence for the President's column, but it is true. Even more strange is that I had my Christmas Day epiphany at Beth Israel Center.

Matt Banks and I were using the day off to arrange chairs in the sanctuary and try to make the place feel more settled. We set up chairs according to one of the options in the design plan. We moved some chairs to the Board Meeting Room and set up the tables. We moved other chairs and set up the reading room. We moved boxes to places where they could remain until it is time to unpack the contents. We did each of these tasks with a familiar sense of urgency.

Staff and volunteers worked at a fever pitch to get us back into the building in early December. This effort was motivated by a number of goals including re-uniting all of our programming under one roof, cease paying rent and, most of all, using the building we have worked so hard to create. Matt and I were working at the same fever pitch when it occurred to me—we don't need to be in such a hurry. We are back in the building and we can resume doing things in a more deliberate fashion.

It was as if the ghosts of Presidents past, present and future conspired to drive that point home—it is time to shift the focus from building a building to using the building. It is time to return to the every-day business of running a shul.

The Executive Committee convened on the first Tuesday of the New Year. We all committed to taking the same energy and enthusiasm devoted to the building project and re-focusing it on our respective charges. The same message was taken to the Board of Directors on the second Tuesday of the New Year and the Board made the same commitment. Though some of our tasks are mundane in comparison to building a building, these efforts are made to achieve the same goal.

February will mark the beginning of our budget planning cycle. I have asked the Committee Chairs to begin planning for next year and to establish priorities and



goals. Staff is busy with programming, planning and running the place. Rabbi Ben-Gideon is coordinating a series of programs on Jewish mediation and mindfulness. Rabbi Rebecca Ben-Gideon will be teaching a curriculum from the Melton Institute. Talmud Torah is in full swing and our various tenants are enjoying the building. It is as if we have hit the reset button and got back to business.

The transition is bitter sweet. I think everyone has enjoyed the enthusiasm and expectation involved in this project. It is tempting to hang on to the excitement of the project, but ultimately that comes at the expense of our larger mission. This point was driven home (no pun intended) when I gave Matt a ride home. I opened the back door to my vehicle and the hard hat CG Schmidt gave me fell out. He asked if I was having a hard time letting go. I have since put the hat on a shelf as a souvenir of this great communal effort. I am excited for Beth Israel Center to be starting our next big projects—whatever they may be.

Adult Education Opportunities

Torah & Mindfulness

Two Sundays and a series of Thursday evenings: March 15 - May 3, 2015

Our awareness of mindfulness and Jewish mindfulness in particular has become much more acute in recent years. Mindfulness, a type of meditation, is a way of directly relating to, and working with, our lived experience as human beings: how we act, think and feel. Mindfulness is not specific to any religious tradition; it is a human capacity. Traditional Jewish sources call this kind of spiritual practice avodah. Avodah reflects Jewish values, the Jewish calendar, and other conceptions of spiritual practice (mitzvot, prayer, Shabbat, etc.).

Jewish practice lends itself to the importation of mindfulness traditions from other cultures. At the same time, rabbis, scholars and practitioners have been finding and developing mindfulness practices already present in Jewish tradition. Three leaders in this area are Professor Richie Davidson, Rabbi Alan Lew z"l, and Rabbi Jordan Bendat-Appell.

To bring these kinds of connections to Madison, Rabbi Jordan Bendat-Appell, co-founder and director of the Center for Jewish Mindfulness (Chicago) and the Director of Regional Programing for the Institute for Jewish Spirituality (New York), will lead a two-part program this spring -- on Sunday, March 15 and Sunday, May 3, from 9:30am until 3:00pm -- with supplementary sessions on several Thursday evenings in between, including one special evening with Professor Richie Davidson.

The program begins on Sunday, March 15 with a timely Passover theme: *Pesach, Matzah and Maror: A Day of Jewish Mindfulness Practice*. Pesach is called z'man cheiruteinu, the time of our freedom, and it is the epitome of a spiritual quality that we cultivate throughout the year and our lives: how can I move from narrowness and constriction to greater expansiveness and freedom? Jewish mindfulness is a practice that can help us enter into these themes of Pesach in a lived way. By engaging in the dynamics of inner liberation in an experiential, felt way, we are able to open up the symbols (like Pesach, matzah and maror) of the holiday for the sake of truly growing as a human being.

The first day-long retreat will draw upon the wisdom of Pesach in order to frame a Jewish mindfulness practice that is accessible and effective. Participants will learn

the fundamentals of this practice and have an opportunity to engage in them over the course of the day through sitting, walking, and eating meditation.

In the weeks between the two Sunday sessions, participants will read Rabbi Alan Lew's groundbreaking book *Be Still and Get Going*, with discussion and practice facilitated by Rabbi Joshua Ben-Gideon on Thursday evenings in late March and throughout April (excluding Pesach).

The cost for the Torah and Mindfulness program, which includes two day-long sessions (March 15 and May 3) and the additional sessions in March and April, is \$72/person for Beth Israel Center members and \$96/person for non-members. The cost also includes Rabbi Lew's book and lunch on both Sundays.

USY International Convention Atlanta 2014 (IC 14) was advertised as the best week of your life, and so far for me, it's been right. The theme of IC 14 was "V'ahavta L'rayacha Kamocha", Love your neighbor as yourself. Meet Your Leadership

Sylvia Grunes, Women's League Representative

Q: When did you join the congregation? About 55 or 60 years ago.



Q: Tell us a little bit about yourself. I have an extended family of over 150 and help organize a reunion every five years. I have six wonderful children, three biological children and their spouses, nine fantastic grandchildren and one beautiful great-granddaughter. Before I retired, 28 years ago, I was a teacher in an open classroom for grades 3-5. That

meant I let each student decide what he or she wanted to study and built a curriculum around that interest.

Q: What are some of the ways you have served the congregation? Over the years, I taught Sunday School, helped with mailings, was a partner with our beloved Annabelle (z"l) in the gift shop, became President of Women's League and was very active both locally and nationally. I prepared our Shabbat kiddush every week for 15 years and worked on many rummage sales. I volunteered every Wednesday helping where it was needed. I still do the yahrzeit reminders and teach a Yiddish class. For the past 15 years, I worked to get a Kosher Mikvah and wept when I saw it was becoming a reality thanks to the many people who made contributions over the years.

Q: What is your favorite thing about Beth Israel Center? The community and how caring and loving it has been over the years. I also enjoy going to Shabbat services and am so glad we now have a hearing device in the sanctuary.

Q: What might surprise people about you? I am a bridge player and go play the slots once a month.

Elana Matthews, VP-Membership



Q: When did you join the congregation and why? We joined in November of 2003. We'd just moved back to town (Willie and I were here first for college and his grad school in the nineties) with a newborn. It would never have occurred to me NOT to join a Conservative shul. I don't mean to sound self-righteous—just trying to show how intrinsic it seemed (still does) to being a grown-up.

Q: Tell us a little bit about yourself. Willie and I live with Lily, who's 11, and Ezra, who's 8, on the near-ish West Side. We share our home with a turtle who is at least 25 years old and Mishi, our cat, who is the boss and knows it. I have been the managing editor of a Political Science journal, *International Organization*, since 2012. Before that I taught college English and writing. I love to bake, read, and run. One day I will find a way to do all three simultaneously.

Q: What roles have you played at BIC? I was on the Talmud Torah committee and served on the search committee for a new Education Director. I was on the Kiddush Committee with the invaluable and indefatigable Paul Wilson and did my time

loading up on herring at Woodmans. I've been on the board since 2009 and served on the Building Committee. I also taught TT kitot gimel, daled, hey, and zayin (not all at the same time) on and off from 2004 to 2012.

Q: What is your favorite thing to do at Beth Israel Center? I love to be at Shabbat morning services. Not necessarily davening or reflecting, just being. No rushing, no obligations, just the sacred here and now. Plus I have an excuse to dress up.

Q: Tell us a story that, in your mind, exemplifies Beth Israel Center. When Trader Joe's first opened, they used to give blown-up balloons to children. I was leaving the store one day with 3-year-old Lily and infant Ezra. Lily's balloon popped, of course, which terrified her. She wailed. Ezra wailed. There was so much wailing, and I must have stopped there, in front of the entrance, to try to do some damage control. A BIC congregant who I did not know well came up to me and, over the wailing, asked if there was anything he could do. There wasn't, but his kindness in the face of all that noise stuck with me. BIC is a caring community. We look out for one another. Most of my family's close friends are fellow congregants, and I don't think that's just by default.

Q: What might surprise people about you? I can crochet kippot like nobody's business.

Q: When did you join the congregation? In the early 1970s shortly after I got a job with a salary and I decided not to sponge off Hillel any more. But I quit after a few years and rejoined in the late 1970s because I missed a congregational home.

Q: Tell us a little bit about yourself. I live in happy contradiction to American demographics by being married to the same one spouse (JoAnn, since 1968) living in the same one house (since 1972) and having the same one professional

job (at the UW for 40 years). I retired from the UW in 2008 and still lecture about the Holocaust and genocide as they are known through the theatre. Also, I travel directing a play I wrote in 2006, "If the Whole Body Dies: Raphael Lemkin and the Treaty Against Genocide." Over the course of my career, I've taught and lived (with family) in Israel, Austria, Chile, the Netherlands, and England.

Q: What is your favorite thing about Beth Israel Center? Participating in social action causes with, I hope, some occasional (positive) effects. The most exciting (and intensely Jewish) activity of my time in Beth Israel was joining with other congregants in the 1980s to create an interfaith group including one Catholic and two Protestant churches. Together, we created a "sanctuary project" and gave refuge to a family of four escaping a U.S.-backed right-wing military regime in Central America. After the successful escape of the family from Madison to Canada, our interfaith group stayed together for several years. The project was a success because of the splendid leadership of Rabbi Chuck Feinberg whose values exemplified the congregational ethos of that time.

Q: When you were asked to join the Board of Directors, did you say "yes" right away? Probably I thought, "If not now, when?" but that was a long time ago.

Q: What might surprise people about you? I failed fire drill in the first grade.
