Thoughts from the Rabbi...

תושבות Makh'shavot: The hope, honor, and joy of Torah

When I show visitors our building, I like to point out the spaces that manifest our communal intentions and shared purpose.

I show them the prep table in the



main kitchen, designed for interaction and friendship-building as our members prepare communal meals; our mikvah, with its resources for marking all kinds of life transitions, because we are a community of

meaning seekers, and its mechanical lift for accessibility, because we strive for inclusivity; the long, wooden *mercaz* (central gathering place) table and chairs that always make room for a new friend to join a conversation over a nosh; and the baskets of kitchen and bath laundry which members take home, wash, fold, and return, because we are the "village" it takes to care for our needs. Then, informed by a sense of who we are, we enter the main sanctuary.

I am perpetually humbled and grateful for the sacred space where we gather to daven and share profound moments in our lives. Each design element points toward the hope of personal growth, communal support, and Divine connection. The ceiling curves to evoke fluid movements of heart, soul, and relationship. Soft yet bright lighting soothes and uplifts our spirits. Open, accessible shelves hold our members' regularly-used tallitot. And elegant, sound-softening wood-tone ceiling panels balance hard white surfaces, acoustically and visually, forming a resonant chamber to maximize our mingled voices, a sacred holding space where the energy we create together can reverberate and nourish us.

That sloping ceiling draws our attention to what lies at the center, lovingly kept in an *Aron Kodesh* (Holy Ark) that could not be more stunningly perfect for us, behind the shimmering parochet (curtain), proudly garbed and adorned: our Torah scrolls. Each

time we parade around the sanctuary holding our sacred Torah scrolls, chant their ancient words and discover ourselves anew therein, we rekindle the shared vision and destiny at the center of who we are.

Torah is the evolving intention that drives our unique and world-changing identity and practices as Jews. Torah is what brings us together in joy and sadness, supporting and guiding us to transform ourselves and bring care, compassion, and uplift to one another and our world. Torah is the beating heart of the Jewish People.

We did not purchase our Torah scrolls, nor did our forebears. Generations ago, our Torah scrolls were bequeathed to us by shuls that no longer needed them. We have cared for them as they aged over many years. At this time, nearly all of our scrolls are unreadable, unfit for use, and beyond repair. Our scrolls also are much heavier than scrolls written today, and they do not align with contemporary materials that we use to prepare to read from the Torah scroll. It is time for us to care for our aged scrolls as befits their condition, and to acquire new scrolls.

How blessed we are to be able to turn our intentions to the mitzvah of "writing" a new Torah scroll!

This is a thrilling opportunity for every member of our kahal. As Maimonides taught, the experience of reading from a new scroll renews our sense of personal relationship to Jewish life. We take hold of a new scroll with a sense of ownership, pride, and anticipation that we cannot gain from scrolls we have inherited (Sefer HaChinukh 613:2).

May our connections to Jewish life and one another be strengthened as every member of our kahal supports the communal endeavor of bringing a new Torah scroll into our midst.

As we write ourselves into Torah, may our intentions bring us hope, honor, and joy.



From the Executive Director's Desk

Financial Fun Facts

Our recently adopted strategic plan calls on us to foster joy, belonging, learning and purpose for our kahal. Purpose can also be expressed as



intention, the idea being that we do things thoughtfully, strategically, and with attention paid both to the big picture and the smallest of details.
Reading through this newsletter.

you may wonder why we take so many different approaches to enabling and encouraging financial contributions to Beth Israel Center. You will see several references to our 75th Anniversary Torah Campaign, information about our third annual Mishloach Manot fundraiser, 3.5 pages acknowledging tribute and memorial gifts, a reminder that if you shop on Amazon your purchases could be benefiting Beth Israel Center, and gratitude from MOUSY for all who purchased Chanukah Candles. Does this seem like purposeful financial planning to you?

It actually is. Each of these endeavors — along with the request each fall that all members make annual contributions commensurate with their income — is deeply intentional. We ask for support in different ways because we appreciate that everyone who cares about the wellbeing and future of our congregation has a unique relationship with Beth Israel Center. Further, our members and friends have vastly different capacity to make financial contributions. When we ask you to make meaningful contributions, we respectfully and intentionally expect you to define "meaningful" for yourself.

We also want you to understand the importance of each gift you make. Some contributions directly impact our annual programming capacity. Others do not. Here are a few fun facts about our finances:

 Annual membership contributions (which some of you think of as "dues") make up 72% of our

- operating income each year. This is the single biggest slice of our annual income pie, and it doesn't fully fund all of our operations. So we hold other annual fundraisers.
- The impetus for our first Mishloach Manot fundraiser (in 2021), was that we couldn't have a fun in-person fundraising event at that point in the pandemic, and we needed joyful connection as well as a way to meet our operating budget obligations.
- The impetus for our first Supper Quiz fundraiser (in 2007) was that our former tradition of rummage sales ended, and with it a source of income our operating budget depended upon.
- ♦ We are intentionally adding to our Building Maintenance Fund so that the building we renovated in 2014 will be well maintained for decades to come. If you have not yet contributed to the L'Dor VaDor building campaign (perhaps because you've joined the congregation in the past 10 years), we could be calling on you to help sustain this effort.
- We recently established the Yesod L'Atid Legacy Society to encourage legacy giving to Beth Israel Center. All you need to do to join Yesod L'Atid is name Beth Israel Center as a beneficiary of your estate. (Let me know if you have any questions!)
- And, yes, in addition to all of these ongoing, annual efforts, we are also embarking on a historic endeavor to celebrate our 75th Anniversary and set ourselves up for a bright future, with at least one new Torah scroll and a necessary infusion to our endowment that will enable us to keep pace with the growing programmatic demands of our kahal.

I hope this small sampling of how our financial puzzle fits together helps you. If you'd like more information, just ask me!

From the Education Director's Desk Living Your Life with Intention

My younger daughter turned three at the beginning of January. As we celebrated her special day, I asked her what she wants to be when she grows up. She loves animals, especially the octopus, and one of her favorite Hanukkah gifts was a veterinary medicine set, so I thought she might talk about that or becoming an animal doctor. Instead, her eyes grew bright, and she proudly proclaimed, "I want to be ice cream!"

As parents, we strive to encourage our children and support their dreams. While becoming ice cream is not a reachable dream, intending to become someone who is sweet and delightful is something that she (and all of us) can strive to achieve. Rabbi Yitz Greenberg once said, "A life without a dream is not a life. But a dream without limits is an illusion." In other words, dream, and let your intentions guide and shape your dreams so that they are reachable.

Here at Beth Israel Center, we share a dream of an exciting, cohesive, warm and inviting community driven by a love of Torah and learning. Our collective purpose is to grow and to nurture our amazing community. Our Talmud Torah seeks to create a vibrant and exciting learning environment in which our students—and their parents—feel supported and engaged. As we enter a new semester and I reflect on the decisions we have made recently to help us realize our collective goal, I would like to share with you some of the intentions behind these decisions and how I believe they are helping our school community thrive.

We have moved to data-driven Hebrew instruction. This means that we assessed students' Hebrew skills and provided curricular material that matched each student's needs, with individualized scaffolding so that all learners can be appropriately challenged. We saw significant growth in Hebrew. We monitored achievement and have continued this Vygotskian approach by choosing each student's next Hebrew book based on their connections to the subject matter and their Hebrew literacy goals.

In addition to our data-driven

decisions, we implemented more transparency into the school by creating "Menschenings," the enewsletter sent to parents on Fridays. It provides

parents a look at what we are doing in Talmud Torah along with important information that parents need to know.

Finally, we focused on our

goals on continuing to build a kahal. We have new teachers starting off the second semester with us along with some new students, including my older daughter, Alana. And we have made some important changes to Matchilim, our Shabbat morning preschool family program, in response to helpful feedback from parents who have been actively participating.

It is vital that we support, share our knowledge, and continue to attend to the features that make our program amazing and unique. We do this by engaging in activities that transcend grade levels, by hearing and helping each other, and through an exciting havruta unit, new this year, which we will continue this semester.

In the next few weeks, we will be sending out a survey to Talmud Torah parents asking how your experience with Talmud Torah has been and what we can do to make it better. We also intend to open up communication with the whole kahal about the goals we want to achieve. I hope to hear your ideas. American author Ken Blanchard said it well, "none of us is as smart as all of us.'

I encourage you to share your hopes and dreams for our students with me. When we align our intentions with our goals, amazing things can happen!

May we go from strength to strength!

Connecting with EXPO of Wisconsin

Members of Beth Israel Center have been working with the Nehemiah Center for Urban Leadership Development on our Confronting Racism initiative – a multi-year effort to investigate and implement becoming an anti-racist congregation.

As part of our journey, Nehemiah has encouraged us to identify a Blackled nonprofit organization with a mission that our members are passionate about and find ways to support their leadership and their mission. To this end, we recently connected with EXPO of Wisconsin.

EXPO (EX-incarcerated People Organizing) works to end mass incarceration, eliminate structural discrimination against formerly incarcerated people, and restore formerly incarcerated people to full participation in the life of our communities.

EXPO emerged in 2014 when

formerly incarcerated people from around Wisconsin began to gather to discuss what it would look like to have a statewide organization created and led by people with lived experience. EXPO members provide support to each other and organize to change Wisconsin's unjust penal system. Since its creation, EXPO has amplified the issues of unjust incarceration policies and practices across the state and has partnered with national organizations to bring these issues to the attention of Congress.

BIC members have begun to build a relationship with EXPO's staff and leadership, and we look forward to bringing EXPO's experiences and voices to our congregation. To begin, **EXPO Executive Director** Jerome Dillard will join us on Wednesday evening, February 8, for a special presentation about the history and mission of EXPO. All are welcome to join on Zoom starting at 7:00 pm.

Re-Learning American History

Expanding our understanding of the depth, breadth, and impact of systemic racism helps us move forward together to build a stronger local community and mobilize our kahal to combat racism together.

This past Fall, two cohorts of Beth Israel Center members took the Justified Anger: Black History for a New Day course, a hallmark Nehemiah program. Each cohort gathered on Zoom one evening per week, starting in September and ending in December, future opportunities to take this to watch engaging, insightful, and often important class with fellow upsetting lectures by renowned history congregants.

Mechirat Chametz - Selling Your Chametz

Before Pesach, we are obligated to remove all chametz from our possession, through rigorous cleaning and by formally selling any chametz of value that we do not wish to destroy. The practice of selling our chametz is traditionally undertaken by a rabbi, and you are invited to formally appoint Rabbi Betsy as your legal agent for this purpose using a document called a *Shtar Mechira*.

It is best to complete this transaction in person. Contact the office to set up a time to meet in Rabbi Betsy's office, or drop in during one of these times:

- Tuesday, March 28, 4:00-5:30pm
- Thursday, March 30, 12:00-1:30pm
- Sunday, April 2, 10:30am-12:00pm

We understand that the ongoing pandemic and other health concerns may preclude some people from meeting up with Rabbi Betsy in person. This transaction may, if necessary, be completed electronically or by mail. A link to the online form will be available via email and on our website, or contact the office and we'll gladly assist.

There is no fee for appointing a Rabbi as agent, but it is customary to make a charitable donation directed to helping those in need celebrate Pesach. This custom is called *Maot Chitin* ("wheat coins"). We collect your donations in fulfillment of this mitzvah and send them to the Jewish Welfare Board, which helps provide a joyful Pesach for Jews serving in the U.S. Armed Forces around the world through their Passover MRE (meals ready to eat) program.

Sell your chametz before 5:00pm on Monday, April 3, 2023. And make a Maot Chitin contribution at the same time if you choose. Checks may be made out to Beth Israel Center, with Maot Chitin on the memo line.

Pre-Pesach Fast / Siyyum - Wednesday, April 5

The Talmud prescribes that all in the category of *b'chor* (first-born) should fast on the eve of Pesach from sunrise until the seder. This fast recalls that the first-born Israelite males were spared the 10th plague visited upon the Egyptians. A Jewish ritual celebration nullifies the fast, and many communities, including ours, nullify the fast by holding a siyyum -- a celebration of completing a unit of study. Lucky you, your Rabbi is studying Il Kings in preparation. The siyyum will be held after morning minyan on Wednesday, April 3. All first-born Jewish humans are welcome, on Zoom or in person. Minyan begins at 7:15am; the siyyum (learning and breakfast) follows at 8:00am.

Pesach Services

Yom Tov (holy day) services begin at 10:00am on Thursday and Friday, April 6 and 7, and at 9:15am on Wednesday and Thursday, April 12 and 13. Yom Tov services are followed by a kosher-for-Passover Kiddush lunch.

Yizkor will be recited on the last day of Pesach, April 13.

Daily minyan and Shabbat morning services will follow the usual schedule during chol hamo'ed (the days in between the holy days), April 8-11. We will not hold services at BIC on Friday evening, April 7. Join us for a special d'var Torah on Caring for our Earth on Shabbat, April 8.
