Purim Carnival ~ Sunday, March 17

This year's community carnival is at Beth Israel Center Presented by Beth Israel Center, Congregation Shaarei Shamayim, Jewish Federation of Madison and Temple Beth El Doors open at 9:00am. Carnival ends at 11:45. Come for the shpiel, stay for the fun and games!

Wednesday evening, March 20: Come hear the full megillah at Beth Israel Center! It's a mitzvah! Bring boxes of rice, couscous or ozro to use as graggers and then leave behind for donation to a food pantry. Be happy! It's almost Adar!

Pesach begins Friday evening, April 19: Come by between 8:30 and 9:30 am on Friday, April 19 to burn your chametz with us. We'll bring the fire, you bring the bits of chametz. And, if you are a first-born, April 19 is the big day for your annual special perk! The Talmud prescribes that all in the category of *b'khor* (first-born) should fast on the eve of Pesach from sunrise until the seder, recalling and recognizing that the first-born Israelite males were spared the 10th plague visited upon the Egyptians. Many do in fact observe this fast. But wait, keep reading! A fast is nullified if there is a Jewish ritual celebration, and many communities, including ours, provide this by holding a *siyyum* - a celebration of completing a unit of Talmudic study. Even if only one person has done so -- and, lucky you, your Rabbi has been studying in preparation for this -- you can get in on it simply by attending the celebration. The siyyum at BIC (with bagels and more, courtesy of Rabbi Forester) will be held after morning minyan on Friday, April 19. All first-born Jewish humans are welcome. Please note that minyan will begin earlier than usual on that day, at 6:45 am.

Let all who are hungry come and eat! If you will have room at your Passover seder table this year, or do not have a seder to attend, please contact the office. We love making seder matches!

Thoughts from the Rabbi...

מחשבות Makh'shavot

I want to offer my heartfelt appreciation to the BIC family for an incredible weekend celebrating our past and our future together. It is a great



blessing to be welcomed into a community that feels like the home where I truly belong. As I continue to learn about our strengths and challenges, I am more inspired every day to serve

you and do my part to raise us all higher.

As this Centerite reaches you, Purim is just a few weeks away, with Pesach right around the corner. Each has its own customs and traditions regarding food and drink. On Purim, we eat and drink with joyful abandon, against a backdrop of the Persian Jews' narrow escape from annihilation in Megillat Esther. On Pesach, we also eat and drink quite a lot, but with order and restraint, as we celebrate our freedom and emergence as a nation ready to enter into a sacred covenant.

Purim and Pesach offer unique sets of Jewish eating practices. Pesach especially brings a chance to think seriously about the food we own and consume. We eat matzah to remember our willingness to drop everything and head off into the wilderness as a liberated nation. Some families use Pesach as an opportunity to keep a fully kosher kitchen, and some choose to maintain a kosher kitchen thereafter. Please contact me if you would like to know about how to make your home kosher for Passover or year-round. I'll be happy to help.

When we eat *matzah* and refrain from eating *chametz* (leavened and other forbidden foods), we unite with Jews world-wide, across the generations. Rich and poor alike eat the same flat bread as we recall our humble origins and focus on the fundamental values that support human thriving. As we remove *chametz* from our homes, we also seek to remove the metaphorical "*chametz*" that takes up space in our lives, keeping us stuck in habits and patterns that do not serve us well. The Season of our Liberation as a People also becomes a time for each of us to contemplate our ongoing, personal liberation and move forward with greater clarity and more joy in our lives.

It is important not to own *chametz* during Pesach. To sell your *chametz*, it is best to see me in person at Beth Israel Center. If that is too difficult, I can also act as your agent if you complete the form that we will provide as *Pesach* approaches.

As you shop for the holiday, it will be helpful to refer to the Rabbinical Assembly Pesach Guide for the year 5779, which we will also make available. I approve the eating of *kitniyot*, a position supported by the Rabbinical Assembly. *Kitniyot* include beans, rice, lentils, edamame, and corn, among other products considered off-limits for Ashkenazi Jews during *Pesach* until recently. *Kitniyot* do not affect the *kashruth* status of cookware or dishes, and those who do not eat *kitniyot* may eat food cooked in pots used for cooking *kitniyot* without compromising their observance.

Regardless of where we are on our Jewish eating journeys, the coming of Purim and *Pesach* are times for all of us to count our blessings, communally and individually, and come together to celebrate. I hope to see you in *shul* on those holidays, and many other times in the weeks and months ahead.

To sweeten that invitation, I am pleased to report that we have decided to kasher the *shul* kitchen for *Pesach* this year and will therefore be serving lunch on the two *Shabbatot* that fall during *Pesach*, as well as the second and seventh days of the Festival of Freedom.

President's Column

January, the Month with Two Faces

I write this in the first week of January while wishes of Happy New Year not allow me enough room even to still echo.

Tradition has it that January derives its name from the Roman god Janus, who is typically portrayed as having two faces, one looking backwards and the other forwards. In that spirit I would like to look backwards at one of the major issues I raised in my inaugural Centerite column in November and forwards to some of the challenges and opportunities coming up.

In my November column I mentioned the need for more effective and coordinated fundraising. This need arises because our regular income would not cover our operating expenses without successful fundraising. In order to balance our budget this fiscal year we targeted \$10,000 in income from the big weekend celebrating our 70th Anniversary and the installation of Rabbi Forester. I'm excited to report that a few weeks before the event, we were expecting to exceed that target thanks to the hard work of the event adopted. When I recently reviewed it, I planning subcommittee as well as important support from the Development Committee. In the coming years we will continue to rely on such efforts to maintain the healthy financial condition we currently enjoy.

To look back and not acknowledge the effects of the hateful act of October 27th in Pittsburgh would be culpably naive. The professional staff and I, along with the members of our newly-formed Security subcommittee, have spent much time and energy addressing the security needs of our promise! kahal. We have had security reviews by the Madison Police Department and two private security firms. We are on the list of Rick Ezell Jewish institutions awaiting assessments

by Homeland Security. This column does summarize their findings. I can say,

however, that all three evaluations have given us high marks for our current provisions and suggested additional ones for our consideration. The Security subcommittee is actively weighing all this information and expects to present

a policy recommendation at the Board's February meeting.

Finally, on a more joyful note, I want to mention that we will be kicking off a new strategic planning effort in the first quarter of this year. Almost 10 years have passed since our last strategic plan was was amazed by how much of the plan we have accomplished. As the saving goes, we planned the work and worked the plan. The arrival of Rabbi Forester and the excitement she is creating in the community represent an especially opportune time to develop a plan that will guide our next period of growth and enable us to go from strength to strength.

Budget Development Timeline

Our annual operating budget comes together each year as a result of this important work: In February (half-way through our fiscal year, which begins September 1), committee chairs and other stakeholders assess budget needs and submit requests. Budget requests for the year beginning September 1, 2019 are due March 13, 2019.

In March, April and May, the Budget Committee creates a draft and works with the Executive Committee and Board of Directors to sort out priorities, with the goal of developing a balanced budget.

If all goes well, as it usually does, the Board will approve our FY 2019-20 budget in June.

From the Executive Director's Desk

Beth Israel Center at 70

As I write this, our big weekend celebrating the congregation's 70th Anniversary and the installation of Rabbi

I imagine that some of our forebears would have had difficulty predicting a time when our shul's rabbi, with a bright smile on her face, would gleefully delay the start of Ein Keloheinu while a toddler makes his shaky way up the steps to join the older children on the bima, for the first time on his own. (The kahal applauded. It was a great Shabbat moment!)

That toddler's father became a *bar mitzvah* in our shul. And several young parents who grew up here brought their children to our Hanukkah party this year.

That's what Beth Israel Center at 70 looks like to me. And I love it.

All Means All

February is Jewish Disability Awareness, Acceptance and Inclusion Month. Now in its 10th year, JDAIM encourages us to raise awareness and foster acceptance and inclusion of people with disabilities and mental health conditions and those who love them.

I want to reiterate here my personal dedication to inclusion and acceptance and remind you that at Beth Israel Center, "all" means all. I am ready and willing to work with you to make Shabbat, children's programs, and other settings comfortable for all of us. If you need to come early or during the week to help your child be comfortable in the building. no problem. If you want a preview of songs we sing, books we read, dances we do, no problem. Want to share the IEP or accommodations that are helping your student in school, please do -- it'll help us, too! If you need something that you may think is completely out of the box and overwhelming to any other person, let's talk! If you need an extra set of hands once you come in the building, let me know and we can find a helpful teenager. I'm not saying that we can do everything -- what I am saying is that you don't have to, either.

The relationship between Judaism and disability goes back to our roots, and there are many texts that give us food for thought. Here are a few for younger audiences from JDAIM.org:

We Can Find a Way Written by Dina Rosenfeld Illustrated by Amy Wummer

Hachnosas Orchim means inviting guests... but it also means making sure that those guests feel comfortable and included. In We Can Find a Way, Eli, Zev and Leah look forward to hosting a celebration for their Bubby's birthday. However, meeting the needs of every guest requires sensitivity and lots of creative thinking. Two of the toddlers have food allergies. What kind of treats work for them? Their uncle is using a wheelchair. He can't use the front steps. One cousin has difficulty being at crowded, noisy events. How will Eli, Zev and Leah find a way to include

everyone? Children ages 3-6 will love the suspense and the positive attitude of the main characters.

The Candlewick Written by Jennifer Rosen Illustrated by Kristina Swarner



The Candlewick is a story of friendship and kindness. The two main characters, Ruthie and Bayla, clearly care for each other. As they live some distance from one another, Ruthie travels to Bayla's home for an extended visit. Ruthie's friend Bayla is deaf, and Bayla has come up with ways to communicate with the hearing world. When Ruthie visits Bayla and realizes Bayla can't hear her doorbell, Ruthie thinks of another idea to help her stay connected to the world around her.

The Mitten String Written by Jennifer Rosen Illustrated by Kristina Swarner

When her family invites a deaf woman and her baby to stay, Ruthie, a talented knitter of mittens, wonders how the mother will know if her child wakes in the night. The surprising answer inspires Ruthie to knit a special gift that offers great comfort to mother and baby and to Ruthie herself. An original folktale about a girl who knits, a deaf woman, and a piece of blue yarn, the Mitten String begins the story that continues in *The Candlewick*.

Meet Your Leadership

Beth Israel Center's Board of Directors sets policies consistent with our Mission and Vision and assures that our committees and professional staff work in concert with those policies. The Board is also responsible for our budget and fiscal well-being. You should know whose hands your synagogue is in, so we are introducing a few Board members in this and future issues of the Centerite.

Marci Katz, VP-Finance

When did you join the congregation and why? We joined shortly after moving to Madison in 1979. I grew up in a conservative synagogue in Flint, Michigan. Beth Israel Center felt like home to me. It was a special place that still feels like home.

Tell us a little bit about yourself. I live with my husband Neal, our standard poodle, Jolie, and our devon rex cat Sidney in a condo near the Capital, having lived in the country for 16 years on 23 acres with a barn, gardens, and groomed trails to play on. I love

being active outside and will be figuring out organic gardening on our patio. I'm a CPA and specialize in health care management. I've had my own company for the past 11 years and contract with the Wisconsin Division of Medicaid Services to develop and provide the fiscal requirements and fiscal oversight of the Family Care and IRIS programs; Medicaid Managed Long Term Care programs serving frail elders and adults with disabilities the services they need to remain in their homes. The programs have grown from a pilot program in five counties to a statewide program that eliminated waiting lists for services and will serve over 60,000 members in 2019.

What has prepared you for service on the BIC Board? I've worked in many settings including public accounting, private industry as a chief financial officer, consulting, board of director positions, and my current contracted engagement with the State. In those roles, I've needed to be a good listener and leader with an eye toward the big picture while leveraging my fiscal expertise to work effectively with management. I recognize, appreciate, and integrate the expertise others bring to the table into my thinking and care deeply about the future of Beth Israel Center.

In addition to your current and past Board terms, in what ways have you served the congregation? Many years ago I was the buyer for and ran the BIC gift shop, something I was sad to see close. I've been chair of the budget committee since 2010 and consulted with Don Miner on accounting issues as required. I also volunteered as needed when my two boys were in Talmud Torah.

What is your favorite thing about Beth Israel Center? I love attending services and think the Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service is the perfect way to end my regular work week. Allowing myself the time and space to stop and just be is very healthy and it doesn't happen unless I'm physically at BIC. Often on Friday evenings, visitors attend, and they are always greeted with warm welcomes, sincere interest, and attention to ensure they feel the warmth of our community. This is at the core of the BIC values and it permeates throughout who we are.

When you were asked to join the Board of Directors. Did you say "yes" right away? I said "yes" after Rick Ezell assured me he would manage meetings effectively. My only concern was time. I serve on four boards, manage my own business, and work



on Sundays for my husband's (Neal) business. Time is precious and I don't serve on boards that can't work effectively.

What do you hope to accomplish as a Board member? I hope to improve the monthly financial reporting process and the budget reporting processes which are both already on track. I also hope to formalize documentation for the various funds, and develop a comprehensive plan for large expenditures, either building or otherwise, that do not come out of our annual operating revenues. Finally, I hope to weave a thread to other committees that relate to finance so we establish a shared understanding of our activities and charge for a cohesive approach to achieving our annual and long term plans.

What may surprise people about you? I got married and had our two boys by 25 and didn't finish my degree in accounting until I was 36. Prior to that I taught aerobics, piano and guitar; sold real estate; and was accepted to the School of Music on piano.

Jeff Mandell, Personnel Committee Chair

When did you join the congregation and why? In Fall 2015, we had just arrived in Madison and wanted both a community and a Jewish education for our kids. We found both at Beth Israel Center. The education program is absolutely phenomenal, more thoughtfully designed than what we had seen at shuls in much larger cities; that was the deciding factor for us. But we were happy to join BIC because we found it a welcoming, pluralistic, deliberate community where Judaism is an organizing principle in people's lives, even as members make diverse personal choices about observance.



Tell us a little bit about yourself. I live on the near-west side with my wife, Sara, our children, Micah and Owen, our dog, Olive (she's a rescued black lab mix), and half a dozen chickens that we share with our next door neighbors. For fun, I love ice cream, games, and magazines. I am a lawyer at Stafford Rosenbaum LLP, where I work primarily on commercial, constitutional, and administrative litigation and appeals. I've practiced law for a dozen years and have been at Stafford since we moved to Madison, about 3.5 years.

What has prepared you for service on the BIC Board? Before law school, I spent several years working in management for nonprofit organizations. I spent a year in Jerusalem on the Dorot Fellowship in Israel, a leadership development program for young American Jews who will develop into community lay leaders. And my years lawyering have exposed me to a variety of corporate governance issues.

What is your favorite thing to do at Beth Israel Center? The Sukkah Hops and the Supper Quiz. I am also a big fan of informal adult study in the Mercaz on Shabbat mornings during Talmud Torah.

BOARD NOMINATION PROCESS

Members of our congregation are selected for service on the Board of Directors after being nominated by our Nominating Committee. The makeup of our Nominating Committee changes from year to year, but it is always made up of our President-Elect, two additional Board members, and two congregants who are not Board members.

The Nominating Committee takes into account many factors when selecting members to put forth for election -past and present roles at Beth Israel Center, leadership qualities, professional and other skills, and experience in other organizations (Jewish and secular).

A slate of directors and officers is presented to the congregation each summer and voted on at our Annual Meeting, which is typically held on the first day of Talmud Torah in the fall.

Officers serve two-year terms. All other Board members serve threeyear terms. The terms are staggered such that each year at least three people are elected to the Board.
