Thoughts from the Rabbi...

Celebrate Torah and Shavuot

In the kiddush, and in all the traditional services of Shavuot, we speak of "chag haShavuot hazeh, z'man mattan Torateinu" (This Festival of Shavuot, season of the giving of our Torah). There



is a subtle yet subversive element to this description of the day: the parallels for Pesah and Sukkot speak of the "season of our liberation" and the "season of our rejoicing,"

each of which can reasonably be derived from biblical sources; however, there is no biblical source that associates Shavuot with the giving of the Torah at Sinai. In the Torah, Shavuot is called *chag haKatsir* in association with the harvest.

There are substantial midrashic efforts to fix the date of the Revelation at Sinai at precisely 49 days after the Exodus—that is, on Shavuot.

Following the destruction of the Temple, Shavuot presented the greatest challenge of the Three Pilgrimage Festivals (regalim). Pesah would retain a universal significance, with the seder growing to become one of the most beloved and universally observed of Jewish rituals. The sukkah similarly can be built anywhere in the world, but the harvest offerings associated with Shavuot could not be perpetuated without the Temple. So the "reconstruction" or reinvention of Shavuot as a celebration of Revelation must be seen as an act of inspired genius by our Rabbis many centuries ago. Our tradition has guided the focus of the day away from the harvest, and over a period of centuries, has built Shavuot into a celebration of Torah.

The musical leitmotif for Shavuot is the melody used for chanting a complex Aramaic poem, *Akdamut*. Interestingly, this same melody is used for the special formula used for calling the Hatan/Kallat Torah for the special aliyah that concludes the reading of the Torah on Simchat Torah. This curious musical midrash connecting Shavuot and Simhat Torah invites us to celebrate Torah in Revelation and recitation. As we chant in *Akdamut*, "even if the sky were parchment and the oceans filled with ink ... the story of God's glory would not be complete ... and yet we rejoice that God blessed us and Revealed to us the Torah."

A famous Midrash teaches that the entire community of Israel overslept on the morning of the Revelation at Sinai and so the custom arose of staving awake ALL NIGHT, so as not to miss the following morning, and was greatly developed in medieval Kabbalistic circles as the Tikkun Leil Shavuot. Let us welcome together with the wider Madison Jewish community the anniversary of Revelation, with an evening (and maybe, just maybe an entire night) of study, reflection, poetry, music, song, and meditation on the theme of Revelation, starting Saturday, May 19 at 7:00.

I look forward to sharing the experience with our friends from sister Madison congregations, from Hillel and Federation. What better occasion to gather the communities together than the anniversary of Sinai, when the entire Jewish people gathered, with hopes and dreams, at the foot of the mountain and heard the ineffable and eternal voice of the Divine

A natural part of the interim role is to transfer rabbinic leadership to the newly appointed rabbi of the shul. I greatly look forward to hearing of the growth and success of this community with Rabbi Betsy Forester.

Traditions Old and New

Beth Israel Center has long balanced tradition with innovation. We are egalitarian, and read the entire parshah each week. Participation in our services and rituals are open to all regardless of gender identity or sexual orientation, and we have (an absolutely beautiful) mikveh. And so it is with our more recently established traditions as well. We celebrate As we prepare to what we've done in the past, while finding ways to innovate and keep our observances and practices fresh and exciting.

The ancient holiday of Lag B'Omer, marking the day slightly more than halfway between Pesach and Shavuot, has the myriad deep roots in Jewish mysticism, and is traditionally celebrated outdoors as a community, where we enjoy each other's company around a fire and find joy in the miracles of the natural world. This will be our tenth year marking the occasion as a congregation with our Lag B'Omer picnic on Thursday 3 May, grilling burgers and hot dogs at the shul in spirited and spiritual revelry. Rabbi Joshua Ben-Gideon established this particular BIC tradition, so come join us in carrying on his legacy in new and exciting ways.

A little more than two weeks later, on Saturday 19 May, we'll honor another tradition with roots in Jewish mysticism when we gather for our Tikkun Leil Shavuot. This year will mark nine years since Rabbi Rebecca Ben-Gideon expanded our tradition of studying late into the night on Erev Shavuot to include scholars from around the community. This year, Reb Sami will take us well beyond midnight as we seek a deeper understanding of Revelation. We are excited this year to partner with Congregation Shaarei Shamayim, Temple Beth El, Jewish Federation of Madison and UW Hillel; the evening will be anchored by a joint teaching and presentation from Reb Sami, Rabbi Laurie look forward to building traditions together Zimmerman and Rabbi Jonathan Biatch.

It seems like only yesterday that we were welcoming Reb Sami to Madison and the BIC community, yet nearly a year has passed and soon he will be moving on to

touch another kahal with his warmth and wisdom. We have been truly blessed to have Reb Sami as our teacher, mentor, pastor and friend this year. We will miss

him, and wish him all and only good things in his new position next year. bid a heartfelt farewell to Reb Sami, we look forward to continuing some of traditions that he has helped establish



in our community over the past year.

Though we will be sad when Reb Sami departs, we are thrilled to welcome Rabbi Betsy Forester to our community to help us continue our old traditions and establish new ones as well. Rabbi Forester is moving to Madison in June, and will officially start on 1 July, but she has already been working with elected leadership and staff to ensure a smooth transition this summer so that our community continues to thrive, nurturing our deep roots and new growth for the future.

From the Executive Director's Desk

My First Trip to Israel

As many of you know, I traveled to Israel for the first time in February. I went with NAASE, the North American



Association of Synagogue Executives. Our association name in Hebrew means "we will do," as in *na'aseh v'nishma*, we will do and we will understand. As a group, we're

doers. We organize things, we make sure they happen. On time, on budget. Many of us don't generally take a lot of time to reflect. Or just let things be special because they're special.

Leading up to the trip, people who had been to Israel before and learned I was going for the first time were really excited for me. Their excitement seemed unique to a first trip to Israel. My sendoff *mishaberach*, with R' Sami's signature flourish, enhanced my sense that I would experience something new and special.

Our conference began in Tel Aviv. Upon arrival, I appreciated the view of the Mediterranean from my hotel room. I put on sandals and walked to Old Jaffa. I noticed the sound of the waves mingled with traffic in this modern, coastal city. It was interesting, but not surprising.

We visited the Agam Museum in Rishon LeTsiyon, the indoor playground in Sderot, designed so that children can be in a bomb shelter within 15 seconds; and the home of Tsameret Zamir, a ceramic artist in Moshav Netiv HaAsara (near Gaza). We participated in her ongoing peace-themed art project on the border wall. These tour stops were meaningful and interesting. Perhaps even a little surprising.

On day three, we drove to Jerusalem. Even in the dark, arriving in Jerusalem had a gravitas to it that I did not expect to feel. Our bus stopped at an overlook, and we piled out. We could see the Dome of the Rock and other landmarks. We had a group lechayim and said Shehechyanu.

Taking that pause, saying that blessing -those acts may have enhanced what made
the moment feel special. But there was
something else there, and I can't tell you
what it was.

What I can describe is my new appreciation for the influence of North American Jews on Israel.

Our opening speaker, Yizar Hess, the director of the Masorti Movement, cited statistics about the growth of liberal Judaism in Israel. He described the frustrations of Masorti and Reform Jews who want to marry or have their conversions recognized or their wine granted a hecksher. He said a lot of interesting things, but what really struck me was his comparison of his own bar mitzvah (a boring, rote affair) to what he saw and felt on his first Shabbat in America, as a young shaliach. He went to a Conservative shul in Phoenix, where there was a bat mitzvah, and he saw and felt a joy, a family connection, a truly spiritual moment that was completely foreign to him.

Later in the week, we heard from Devora Greenberg, who also works for the Masorti Movement and also discovered a kind of Judaism she didn't know existed when she came to America after her army service and spent time at Camp Ramah.

Our wrap-up speaker, Rabba Chaya Rowan Baker, an Israeli born rabbi, told stories of the Masorti shul she's been leading for 10 years. It was founded 40 years ago by Americans who made *aliyah* and wanted to create in Israel what they left in America.

All three found something in North America that they are now working hard, and against some fundamental, even fundamentalist obstacles, to cultivate in Israel. That's something I can understand better having been there.

Thank you for making my first trip to Israel possible.

From the Education Director's Desk

Israel From Another Angle

In mid-February you gave me the opportunity to recharge my batteries at the 66th annual Jewish Educators
Assembly conference in Israel. Israel presented a unique tableau from which to gain a better understanding of what Israelis face in their everyday lives, the remarkable accomplishments and technological achievements of the modern state and a look back at history – all presented through the lens of how we can take the experience home with us and present an honest picture of the modern state while imbuing a love of Israel.

We spent our first four days in Be'er Sheva, the capital of the Negev. Highlights for me were a scene-setting lecture by author Professor Gil Troy, a lot of rain (in the desert!), and a visit to "Abraham's Well". Our 3rd day was hosted by the Jewish National Fund and we visited some of the incredible projects that JNF has undertaken in the south. First was the Indoor Children's Playground in Sderot. This remarkable play space allows children to be children with easy and direct access to safe bomb shelters within the building. The afternoon took us to Aleh Negev, a remarkable rehabilitation village that draws visitors from around the world to learn from their model. Next stop was Wadi Atir in the Bedouin Village of Hura in which we saw a sustainable farm that is based on ecology, technology and sustainable energy. Final stop was the Be'er Sheva River Park, currently under construction. Here we honored our colleague who died just before our trip with an emotional tree planting ceremony. Day four began with Rosh Chodesh services at the Masorti synagogue in Be'er Sheva. From there we continued to the Ramon Crater for a breathtaking view. After lunch we toured the Ramon Visitor's Center, which has been dedicated to and tells the story of Ilan Ramon, the Israeli astronaut who died on the space shuttle Columbia. This experience was quite different from 27 years ago, and was a terrific addition to the natural beauty of the area. For dinner

we visited the development town of Yerucham and were hosted in the home of one of the residents. The women of

Yerucham have turned their cooking skills into a unique catering business, hosting visitors in their homes, sharing their culture and telling their personal stories.



Friday we headed to Jerusalem for Shabbat. First we stopped at Israel's 9/11 memorial in the forest just outside of Jerusalem. Israel is the only country in the world that has a memorial listing all of the names of those who perished. We shared stories of people we knew and then recited kaddish for all.

There is nothing like Shabbat in Jerusalem. I went with one of our groups to Kabbalat Shabbat at Shira Hadasha. then to our hotel for dinner, where we hosted David Breakstone, the Deputy Director of the Jewish Agency for Israel. David spoke after dinner about the challenges of religious pluralism in Israel, particularly as it relates to the non-Orthodox branches. On Shabbat morning I walked to the Kotel, visiting the egalitarian Robinson's Arch area for the first time, which moved me greatly. After lunch, I enjoyed a walking tour of our neighborhood, learning the fascinating stories of some the historical homes and their residents.

Our annual conference provides an opportunity for professional growth, exploration of new trends and ideas and acquisition of concrete programs and materials to bring home. Our travels in Israel, in particular, re-invigorated us and sent us home with renewed passion and enthusiasm to share experiences with our communities.





Interfaith Outreach: A Unique Passover Seder

On Sunday, March 25, Rabbi Barth and members of BIC joined with Reverend
Everett Mitchell and members of his Christ The Solid Rock Church for an
abbreviated seder at the church, one designed to introduce its mostly African-



American members to our reliving of the Jewish freedom story, so strongly linked to their own traditions of struggle, survival and yearning for freedom.

This model seder grew out of a personal link between the two congregations. Leanne Puglielli is both a longtime, active member of CTSRC and a friend of longtime, active BIC member Judy Pierotti. Having heard Rev. Mitchell repeatedly stress the story of the Hebrews' bondage in

Egypt, and having attended a seder hosted by Judy, Leanne encouraged Rev. Mitchell to enrich his church's identification with the Jewish past by showing its members the Jewish tradition of recalling that past. Once Leanne and Rev. Mitchell requested BIC's help, Judy and Rabbi Barth quickly agreed; much planning, recruiting and cooking followed, to produce the March 25 event.

CTSRC members greeted their BIC visitors with a very engaging combination of enthusiasm, gratitude and good humor (even though by the time we arrived they had already—this being a Sunday--spent many hours in church). Rabbi Barth led the seder, beginning with an assurance that the Passover seder invites energetic participation rather than dignified order, so that questions and side discussions can go on at any time. And they did! BIC members sat dispersed among the church members and we found ourselves explaining, elaborating, answering questions, offering our own stories, laughing and enjoying with our curious and receptive neighbors. Haroset, I believe, scored a hit with just about everyone from the church. Gefilte fish, not so much. The high point of the evening (to my mind, at least) came

with the singing of *Go Down, Moses*, with the lead taken by Mary Henderson of CTSRC and the choruses sung by all of us together.
