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

I am writing to you before *Pesach*, imagining what life will be like by the time this Centerite goes out. The idea of all of us convening in one place still feels like a far-off fantasy,



but with
predictions that
we may reach
"herd immunity"
by mid-summer,
it also feels real
and possible to
imagine that
before long, we
will laugh
together, cry
together, and
live out life's

important moments in shared space. I am so excited to move forward together with all that we have learned from this time away. I look forward to providing healing rituals to mark the joy of our return as well as to mark what we have lost. You will hear more about those plans as we discern our readiness to implement them.

With all of that excitement, I must admit to feeling a bit nervous. Our sages teach that our ancestors celebrated their imminent liberation and sang a song of joy while tumult raged around them on their last night in Egypt. Hopeful, yet fearful, they sang with gratitude over hopes not yet realized. Like our ancestors experienced on the verge of liberation, our world still is a prickly place. Many of us will want to hurry back, yet we will need to be incredibly present to our evolving needs. I look forward to re-emerging, step by step.

At this time of rapid change in the religious landscape, I am grateful to all of you for making BIC a spiritual home I feel proud to lead over the next several years. While this Centerite sits on your coffee table, I will begin what I expect will be the last professional contract of my career, beginning this summer and ending in summer 2030. In the first three years of our relationship, we weathered trials and tribulations that came our way. We have learned much together. We have grown stronger in some ways and there are areas that we will need to strengthen when we return. Whatever comes, I am confident that we will keep learning and growing together.

Wishing you a summer filled with hope, happiness, and enjoying the Madison Summer vibe we love.

On Whose Shoulders

Shemot Rabbah, a Midrashic commentary on the Book of Exodus, contains an interpretation of what it means to assume a leadership position in a Jewish community: "When one assumes a role of responsibility within a congregation, an individual is enjoined to no longer say 'I live for my own benefit, I care not about the community is on that person's shoulders." (Shemot Rabbah 27:9).

Beth Israel Center thrives because of our strong cadre of volunteers; some entered the pandemic with community responsibilities, others took them on in the past year. What it takes to serve a community in times of crisis is profound and worth honoring. Gratefully, BIC has not been in crisis this last year; we continue to live into our mission, offering programming, services, and community outreach. Our members, however, have been, and continue to be, in crisis. We are all experiencing loss, disconnection, and anxiety for the future. Every single person this last year has experienced new and profound dislocations, and the full accounting of the impact has not yet begun.

When we say "every single person" has been, and continues to be, affected by the pandemic, that includes every BIC volunteer, committee member, committee chairperson, and board member. It is also important to recognize that serving the BIC community has taken more time and more effort than in the before-times because of the scale and urgency of the decisions being made, and because it takes extra emotional effort to do the work.

Your executive committee met weekly for months to hone COVID policies for BIC. Your Budget Committee moved from meeting only during budget season to monthly meetings, proactively guiding our fiscal practices in this uncertain year. Your Social Justice Committee is doing more, not less, in response to increased needs. Your Ritual Committee has navigated myriad innovations in Shabbat and weekday offerings. Your Talmud Torah committee creatively adapted our rich and deep curriculum

to connect with and teach students over Zoom and, more recently, in small in-person groups.

Steve Jellinek and Aaron Friedman assumed new roles as VP-House and

parents. Dozens of



volunteers delivered bagels and Mishloach Manot, bringing a little bit of BIC to everyone's doorstep.

Also this winter, an ad hoc committee of Bennett Berson, Steve Jellinek, and Marci Katz partnered with Rabbi Betsy to negotiate the terms of a 9-year contract, which the board unanimously approved in January. The mutual respect and generosity on display through the negotiating process is a model of BIC collaboration at its very best.

Our volunteer community has stepped in to help carry the community on their shoulders. There was no playbook for modern synagogue life in a pandemic. Our lay leaders have endeavored to follow the Midrashic teaching not to center what is for "our own benefit", but to focus on broader congregational needs.

I want to extend my deep gratitude to everyone who donated time, energy, creativity, suggestions, and thoughtfulness to strengthening our *kahal* during the pandemic. The examples in this column are far from a comprehensive list. Our entire community is enhanced by your choosing to stand up and help carry us on your shoulders.

BIC always benefits from new voices and energy, so if you would like to learn about ways you can help carry the community forward, please let me know.

From the Executive Director's Desk

Part of Something Bigger

For the second time in the past year, United Synagogue for Conservative Judaism (USCJ), an organization serving 500+ Conservative



congregations (including ours), invited me to present for a webinar. The topic was Membership Engagement, and I was asked to describe one way that we are engaging

members during the pandemic.

In deciding what to focus on, I recalled that when we first closed our doors back in March 2020, we speedily moved all non-Shabbat activities to Zoom and created new opportunities for ritual and Torah study. (Interestingly, since moving weekday minyan to Zoom, we no longer struggle to make the minyan.)

As much as it felt like exactly the right response when the pandemic first hit, being off-line on Shabbat created a huge void in our congregational life, and we heard how much you missed Shabbat. Whether that meant services, kiddush lunch, singing together, socializing, or a combination of some or all of those things, we missed our communal Shabbat. And it wasn't just the people who came most often who missed it.

As it became clear that the pandemic was going to be part of our lives for more than a few weeks or months, we had two related realizations. With no Shabbat kiddush to plan, we had an opportunity to direct resources to other kinds of programs. And with no Shabbat kiddush to attend, our members wanted things from us that we hadn't previously considered our responsibility to provide -- reasons to come together, in small groups.

Before the pandemic, we very intentionally directed our programming resources to things that were unique to us as a synagogue. Nearly all of our programming, and of our Program Director's time, focused on Jewish

ritual life -- when we offered a cooking class, it was on blintzes or gefilte fish. When we held book discussions, they were part of our Sinai and Synapses series or by Jewish authors. Week in and week out, our Program Director spent significant time recruiting volunteers and planning our Shabbat kiddush lunch.

The shutdown of our Shabbat gathering became an opportunity.

We rolled out several new programs last summer -- all outdoors. Deborah Hoffman organized boating, nature walks, the Shabbat Shidduch matching effort in which people visited each other (outdoors and taking appropriate precautions), and more.

As winter set in, and the pandemic got worse, we shut a lot of that down. Now, as things are starting to warm up, and more and more members are getting vaccinated, we're planning social programs again.

As long as we have to restrict the number of people who can attend Shabbat services in person, and until we can offer a safe way for an unrestricted number of people to stick around for lunch -- or at least a nosh -- after shul, we will continue putting the resources that previously went into Shabbat kiddush lunch into other kinds of programming.

This approach to congregational engagement resonated with many of the webinar participants. Some were impressed with the specific programs I described, and it felt good to be seen as an example for others.

We are a shul that others look to for ideas and support. At the same time, we have a lot in common with other congregations — notably a deep desire to put this pandemic behind us, along with appreciation for what it's taught us about what matters most.

From Strength to Strength

This time last year, I recounted the heroic work that our Talmud Torah students and teachers did at the end of the 2019-20 school year, when we closed the building and moved into our homes. I concluded with "Thank you for a wonderful, if peculiar, year. I hope we go from strength to strength and from living rooms to classrooms soon". A year later, I can say that we went from strength to strength this year, and eventually incorporated both living room sanctuaries and BIC sanctuaries into our lives. Since February, Talmud Torah students have been learning and praying in small groups together about every other week in our building-based sanctuaries as well as a concurrent robust online tefillah and parsha study (our Zoom sanctuary). On May 8 we'll gather in a hybrid way to celebrate our learners who are marking significant transitions in their Jewish educational life. First, our 7th graders who are moving on from a 3-day-aweek Talmud Torah commitment to Netivon (our Shabbat-based high school program) and Midrasha. This small but mighty group are tight friends who can often be found texting (sometimes during TT...), sharing life's ups and downs and playing heated games of Among Us. Their long-term friendship is inspiring, and the Shabbaton I spent with them in 6th grade may be a highlight of my career. These students are: Dafna Copelovitch, Lilah Heifetz, Sydney Kasin and Joshua Pierotti.

Our 5th graders are a group of strong individuals. They are artists, thinkers, competitors and questioners who can jump off each other's ideas (and sometimes on each other...) to shape and strengthen themselves. They will step into a new world of B'nai Mitzvah preparation by receiving a Siddur Lev Shalem and joining our Shabbat Morning Program. I am so proud of and excited for Asher Berland, Roger deLaix, Shayna Dolin, Anna Ellenberg, Austin Kasin, Micah Mandell, and Raphael Shelef.

Our 2nd graders (and their families) are enhancing their Jewish education by beginning their 6-hour-a-week course of study at Talmud Torah next year. Gabe

Goldman, Nash Hollander, Rose Irving, Lev Stolz-Greenberg, and Solomon **Weismer** are enthusiastic participants in anything we've asked of them. They

are interested and interesting and are always so happy to see each other, whether in person or on screen. We honor them and their families for making this extended commitment to their education and to Talmud Torah.



Our teachers make Talmud Torah what it is. This year they went above and beyond, teaching from their homes in Madison, Michigan, Minnesota, and Israel, with uncertainty our only constant. This year's faculty was carefully chosen to be adaptable, responsible and dependable. They turned out to be supportive, imaginative, constructive and comforting. I could not have hoped for better colleagues with whom to plan and endure this year. Maya Desai, Hilda Fine, Shira Forester, Deborah Hoffman, Azariah Horowitz, Talia Ivry, Noa Okner, Dena Rosen, Noam Scheepens, Ellen Weismer, and Moira Wilson, I cannot thank you enough.

As a special treat for reading to the bottom of this column, a meise (story): (Not so) long ago, in a city far, far away, young Ellen Grossman (now Ellen Weismer) was taught in Hebrew high school by Jonathan lvry, then a graduate student. Jonathan helped build Ellen's interest in Jewish studies. and Ellen came to the UW-Madison for her undergraduate and graduate degrees, mentored in Jewish education by Simone Schweber. In one of her many roles in the Madison Jewish community, Ellen taught Jonathan and Simone's daughter, Talia Ivry, at Gan HaYeled. This year, Talia, a Talmud Torah graduate, came back to teach our oldest students. One of them? Nevaeh Weismer, Ellen's daughter.

If you or someone you know could benefit from some home-delivered meals, please do not hesitate to ask. Many people want to help, and needs are typically filled with surprising speed.

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
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Purim, Pandemic Style!

Services Survey: Initial Gleanings

The Ritual Committee and staff are grateful to everyone who provided feedback on our Post-Pandemic Services Survey in early March. Thoughtful comments from more than 110 congregants, along with data provided in the closed-ended question responses, will be very helpful as we determine what services will look like when we can gather in person.

When this newsletter went to press, the Ritual Committee was busy reviewing the survey findings. A few gleanings are clear:

- Survey respondents overwhelmingly expressed gratitude for the variety and consistency of offerings through the pandemic thus far.
- The kahal is eager to return to our pre-pandemic Shabbat practices.
- Being together is what respondents have missed most.
- Zoom has brought about some positive changes in our ritual life that are likely to continue even when it is possible to hold in-person services.

The Ritual Committee is working with Rabbi Betsy to integrate some changes as we move forward. For example, we anticipate continuing to hold daily minyan using a blend of in-person and online options. Also, starting in April, we began welcoming small numbers of people to participate in services in person. 

NEW: The Herman Goldstein Fund



Herman Goldstein, z"l. was a dedicated member of Beth Israel Center from the time he arrived in Madison in 1964 for a position at the **ÚW** Law School until

his death on January 24, 2020, at the

age of 88.

In 2018, Herman made a generous gift to Beth Israel Center with the understanding that it would be used by Rabbi Forester to advance her vision for the congregation. Subsequently, other donors made gifts similarly intended to support the vision and work of our then-new Rabbi. More recently Herman's three children -- Mark, David, and Rahel -- have made contributions in the same spirit. With these combined gifts, we are pleased and honored to announce the establishment of the Herman Goldstein Fund.

Donations to this fund may be used by our Rabbi to advance her vision for Beth Israel Center -- just as Herman intended with his initial gift.

Herman was beloved by many in our congregation. Whether the relationship consisted of casual conversations over Shabbat kiddush. nearly lifelong companionship, or something in between, any connection to Herman was warm, kind, thoughtful, and intellectually stimulating.

What follows is excerpted from Rabbi Forester's eulogy:

Herman was proud of his Jewish heritage and deeply committed to Jewish life. He was also widely known, acclaimed, lauded, and honored the world over for his work in criminology. In both realms, Herman was at his core a man of integrity, compassion, intelligence, and an innate spiritual wisdom who believed that goodness can be found in the darkest places.

His public achievements were matched by an inner conviction, and he leveraged faith in the human spirit and the potential of law to foster a society in which human beings can thrive with dianity and security.

His body of work was recognized in June of 2018, when Herman was awarded the Stockholm Prize in Criminology. The Stockholm Prize is one of the most prestigious international academic awards in the field of police studies, given for outstanding achievements in criminological research, or for the reduction of crime and the advancement of human rights.

He could have used his status for personal gain, but he chose instead to leverage it to serve more deeply and more broadly, putting considerable time and thought into consulting, advising, and mentoring even when there was limited or no compensation. He was the epitome of a public servant.

While he was changing the face of police work, Herman was raising his children, sending them to Camp Ramah, and taking an active part in the Jewish community. He was a close advisor to Rabbi Chuck Feinberg during his time at Beth Israel Center (1973-1988) and a beloved member of this congregation. He welcomed guests into his home and was a consummate host. As his mother had done, he made Shabbat dinners a regular family ritual, complete with blessings and traditional foods. That was for starters. At the table, he would want to hear about important experiences from everyone's week. and then there would be a discussion, with text sources, often from The New York Times.

To know Herman was to know how much he loved to be of service in this world. He always wanted more time to sit in robust and probing conversation and to marvel in each person's uniqueness. We are grateful for the blessing of knowing Herman Goldstein, a man of integrity, thoughtfulness, decency, and humility, a man who knew that life is precious and all human beings deserve dedicated interest and care. He believed that human goodness could be raised up. And he raised it up.
