Thoughts from the Rabbi...

חובשה Makh'shavot: Seasons of Joy

Shortly after I came to Beth Israel Center, we rebranded and adopted our new logo and tagline "Celebrating Jewish Life Together." Not long thereafter, we created a new strategic



plan that identifies
"Joy - החחש
(Simchah)" as one of
our four core values.
The perfection of
that value lies not in
a series of delightful
experiences but in
"feeling enriched
and moved and
awake," as our
Strategic Plan notes.

Center we celebrate Jewish life deeply together precisely because we live through the full array of emotions and experiences with intention, our

minds open to new learning and our hearts open to enrich and extend the circles of belonging that make our shul a true spiritual home, a place and a kahal that help us to thrive throughout the seasons-not only the happy ones. Sharing connection at times of sadness or trepidation deepens our capacity to rejoice together at happy times. A kahal

that cooks for its sick and offers quiet presence to its bereaved sings and dances more jubilantly at b'nei mitzvah, baby celebrations, and weddings. People who fast together eat together with more profound gratitude. People who labor to build community in the many ways it takes experience our shared blessings as abundance.

Happily, we have four seasons of joy here in Madison: Pesach, Shavuot, Sukkot, and Summer. Notwithstanding the fact that Tisha B'Av, arguably the saddest day in the Jewish calendar, falls in July or August each year (preceded by three weeks in which we take measures to limit our joy), the Madison summer is core to our vitality. How happy we are to bask in it together!

Summer is also a great time to contemplate Rabbi Alan Lew's This is Real and You Are Completely Unprepared, in which he writes that joy does not refer to "fun" alone: "Joy is any feeling fully felt, any experience we give our whole being to. We are conditioned to choose pleasure and to reject pain, but the truth is, any moment of our life fully inhabited, any feeling fully felt, any immersion in the full depth of life, can be the source of deep joy."

At least three times a day, we daven the Ashrei together, beginning with the words "Happy are they who dwell in Your [God's] house; they will go on to praise You." Even a shiva minyan opens with those words. We can speak of happiness at a time of sorrow because supporting each other through all of life's ups and

downs is the most joyful gift we can offer each other. Together, we create "God's house," the place where we are always loved, received with compassion, and never cut off, when we show up genuinely for one another.

As Summer wanes, we will add Psalm 27 to our morning and evening prayers, saying throughout the holiday season: "One thing I ask of Adonai—to dwell in

God's house all the days of my life." We pray to dwell in that spiritual place knowing it is ours to build with our helping hands, shared skills, welcoming smiles, listening ears, open hearts, and financial resources.

"Tears linger for a night, and joy comes in the morning," sings the psalmist. A strong Jewish community makes room for tears, laughter, and all the moments in between. That is how we celebrate Jewish life together.

What a joy it is to nurture such a place with you.

The Joys of Kiddush

On a typical Shabbat morning, congregants arrive early – or not so early – to Beth Israel Center's main sanctuary. In the preceding week, some have learned to chant a portion of the weekly parashah or haftarah, sharpened their davening skills, prepared a d'var Torah, strategized about getting children to Talmud Torah on time, or spent time organizing the weekly announcements. One by one, participants discharge their responsibilities until our youngest congregants ascend the bima to lead the concluding prayers.

As Shabbat morning services end, attention shifts to the relaxed joy of Kiddush – putting behind us the nervous energy of the morning's responsibilities, visiting with friends

prepared and served by our dedicated Kiddush Crew volunteers. In a sense, Kiddush embodies the notion of Shabbat M'nuchah (Shabbat of Rest).

As an organization, we understand the role our our newly greened Kiddush plays in making BIC a

welcoming space, and its importance in sustaining our community, especially as we return, some more cautiously than others, to in-person gathering. It comes as no surprise that food motivates action! Beth Israel Center's operating budget supports our ability to provide a tasty Kiddush buffet, and we count on Kiddush sponsorships (starting at \$400) and contributions (of any size) to the Martin & Serene Mazor Kiddush Fund when building our Kiddush budget.

So heartily has our congregation embraced the renewed joys of Kiddush that this year's Kiddush budget has not kept pace with our needs. Indeed, from www.bethisraelcenter.org/sponsortime-to-time we hear that our Kiddush offerings are too limited, too spare, or too repetitive. Fortunately, some congregants have stepped forward to enhance our experience by sponsoring a Kiddush to note an important milestone or to recognize a special

person. You might have heard me muse on Shabbat that "a sponsored Kiddush is a win-win-win: the sponsor feels good, the honoree feels loved, the congregants are well fed,

and some of the sponsorship funds bolster the Kiddush line in our operating budget." I have come to appreciate that Kiddush sponsorship does more than enhance our Kiddush buffet on



What does this mean for us? We now enjoy about one dozen sponsored Kiddushim per year, about once a month. If we were to double or quadruple that rate. our congregants would quickly get used to kugel, or

lox, or other special Kiddush treats that come with more sponsorships. The kavod shown toward our sponsors would last for months, and more honorees would feel special. If sponsoring on your own (for \$400, \$580 or \$810) is not in your personal budget, I encourage you to consider joining together with others (your extended family, a group of friends, a Talmud Torah cohort). Think creatively about recognizing people (parents, children, teachers, staff, volunteers) and occasions (birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, promotions, retirements, honors). From the Executive Director's Desk

Finding Joy

Our Strategic Plan likens the core value of "joy" to "creating a sense of fulfillment in all that we offer, whether it is our daily Jewish rituals, holiday liturgy and celebrations, social



activities and/or social justice initiatives." Further, the plan recognizes that every member will not experience joy at every gathering. Rather, the point of claiming that joy is worth striving for is that each of us can expect to feel

enriched, moved and enlivened by the services, programs, classes, or other gatherings in which we choose to participate.

As a young mother, I didn't come to shul regularly. Perhaps our first attempt as new parents to attend a Friday night service followed by dinner discouraged me. We left before the end of services because our infant (who is now 27) went on an epic screaming jag, and we were new enough to the community, and to parenthood, that we chose leaving over staying with a crying baby.

That infant eventually stopped screaming, and we started coming to shul a little more often. For years before shul became a regular habit for me, I nearly always left thinking "I should do that more often." Something about the kavanah of the worship experience or the taste of the meal or the intellectual stimulation of the program or the warmth of the people I just spent time with did exactly what our strategic plan calls on us to do now — create a sense of fulfillment.

Little did I know then that I would someday be one of the people responsible for sustaining, developing, and publicizing offerings rich in kavanah, tasty flavors, engagement, and warmth — all in the hope of helping people find fulfillment, find joy, through this special community.

From where I sit now, I see many different ways to engage in congregational life. I also see signs that many readers of this newsletter

aren't aware of everything that we offer, despite our efforts to communicate not only on these pages but also in our weekly e-news, special event announcements, annual report, website, Facebook page, printed bulletins and fliers, live announcements at the end of services, and more.

We use a lot of communication tools — some more effectively than others. And there are tools out there that we don't use. (You won't find BIC on Twitter. Or Instagram.)

I am very interested in learning what works, what doesn't, and what we should try so that more of you can be more aware of the opportunities for fulfillment — for joy! — that you can find at Beth Israel Center.

Are we sending too many emails? Should we start texting about upcoming programs? Do you look for information on our website that isn't where you're clicking? Do you enjoy receiving this newsletter? (Do you know how often it comes?)

No two of you will answer the above questions the same way, but I'm asking anyway, and I am working on a survey the results of which will help us evaluate our communication strategy.

In the meantime, if you'd like to send me an email or find a time to chat about this, I'd love to know in a more informal (but perhaps more informative) way:

- 1) How do you get information about BIC?
- 2) How do you get information about other things that matter to you -- your workplace/school, political/social causes, entertainment, etc.
- 3) What annoys you about how you get (or don't get) information from BIC or other important entities in your life?
- 4) What do you look forward to receiving?

These are just details. The big question is: How can we help you find joy?

This is a credit to our amazing teachers and staff who teach our children in Talmud Torah! We are so lucky to have such a wonderful, caring, and dedicated staff who make it their mission to create new and exciting ways for our students to experience learning! Next meeting: Shabbat afternoon, June 3



Joshua Gabai Board Member-at-Large

When did you join the congregation? I moved to Madison after college to work at Epic in the Summer of 2013, and I had it in my head before I arrived that I would join the local Conservative synagogue. However, even that premeditation didn't prepare me for how warmly and enthusiastically I would be welcomed into the community here, literally from my first steps through the doors of the old building.



Tell us a little about yourself. I have done a number of disparate jobs over the years, but in the last couple years I've become a professional Game Master through StartPlaying.Games. I facilitate cooperative storytelling experiences for clients all over the country (and beyond) through Dungeons & Dragons and other roleplaying games. A couple years ago my fiancée, Hannah, and I bought a house at the edge of Verona and Madison. We have a couple of pet aloe plants named Waldorf and Statler. We like to play all sorts of games for funcard games, board games, video games, storytelling games, etc.

What has prepared you for service on the BIC Board? Jewish community has always been important to me. In college, I worked hard as an officer and president of my campus Hillel, building community, planning events, coordinating with outside groups, fundraising, and more. After four years, when I graduated and moved to Wisconsin, I was ready to be responsible for my own Jewish experience and disappear into a congregation for a while. Over time, I've thawed back out, picking up responsibilities here and there such as volunteering, committee work, and leyning. And now board service.

Tell us about your involvement at BIC. I volunteer for event planning and setup (and cleanup, of course), read Torah, teach in the Talmud Torah, and, over the past several months, worked with my first b'nei mitzvah student here. I also served on the Youth Committee and helped with fundraiser events like the Supper Quiz and the Purim Masquerade Ball. My favorite BIC activities are any time we come together to eat and talk to each other — whether for Shabbat kiddush, Friday nights in the park, breakfast after morning minyan, dinner events, or anything else. In particular, I appreciate Kolot Kehilla. Not only does it illustrate and celebrate the diverse backgrounds and skillsets of our community, but it is such a wonderful platform for us to come together to share and eat and care and learn.


What went through your mind when you were asked to join the Board? I knew I wanted to join the Board eventually, but was I ready now? Did I have the time and bandwidth to give the time and energy the responsibility warranted? Ultimately the answer I came to was "yes," but it wasn't a decision I took lightly.

What may surprise people about you? I collect wooden boxes — some are simple, many have inlaid art patterns, several have dovetailed sliding lids and other interesting features. The most recent addition to my collection is an old weathered box with metal filigree and a missing latch. My grandmother used it to hold candles, and I now keep my Shabbat candles in it.

Mimi Aron Board Member-At-Large

When did you join the congregation? In 2021, I had recently moved to the Madison area from Cleveland, where my late husband and I were regular Shabbat attendees and were strongly connected to the Jewish community. Despite the pandemic, I was looking for my new "temple family."

Tell us a little about yourself. I live in Madison, on the west side, and enjoy spending time with my charming partner



Tell us about your pre-retirement life. I graduated from The Ohio State University with a degree in physical therapy, then worked in the field for 48 years, retiring in 2022. For 20 of those years, I was a geriatric clinical specialist. My most favorite work experience was working at the Cleveland Clinic in their home care division. I loved working one-on-one with people, in their own personal space. I also learned so much clinically working with heart lung transplants, kidney transplants, heart patients, and fresh orthopedic patients. Since coming to Madison, I have also become a certified grief educator and have led a support group for those who have suffered a loss by suicide. I hope to offer this group again sometime in the near future.

What has prepared you for service on the BIC Board? In 1976 I was Sisterhood president at Congregation Sons of Abraham in LaCrosse. I also served as a board member at Temple El Emeth in Youngstown, Ohio, and Congregation Sharrey Tikvah in Cleveland, Ohio.

Tell us about your involvement at BIC. My family's tradition is to be in the kitchen, so it's no surprise that my first volunteer task here was making pies for Christmas Dinner. I have progressed to being a Kiddush Supervisor. I love being in the kitchen and also like being a part of the weekday minyan.

What went through your mind when you were asked to join the Board? I did have concerns about the "politics of a shul" and was assured that this is not an issue at Beth Israel Center, so after consulting with my daughter and partner, who gave me encouragement, I accepted the offer.

What may surprise people about you? One of my "home" care patients was a Saudi VIP in a hotel suite, where I was escorted everywhere I went and had to contend with quite a cast of characters, including two ladies in waiting who were at her beck and call at all times. Family was also close by, and the suite was full of food and flowers. The patient had shopping to do in Europe and did not stay long enough to complete therapy. Priorities!


